Item 1.

 rage) and George, Wagon and Harrow, Hogshead
 and Kitchen Furniture, the tract of land and
 joining the Georgia Factory and a Water Land
 and Town lot purchased by me. It is my wish
 and desire that all the land owned by me
 (except my house) and lot in Athens on which
 I now reside, be sold by my executor herein,
 as he may deem and the money raised from this
 sale after paying my just debts, be injected
 in such investments, my executor may deem
 best for the support of my wife and two
 youngest children, until they become of age
 or marry.

Item 2nd I give and bequeath one of my Gold Watches
 to my Georgia Son.

Item 3rd I give and bequeath one of my Gold Watches
 to my wife, Martha H. Moore.

Item 4th I give and bequeath to my daughter Penny
 P. Moore my Diamond Ring.

Item 5th I give and bequeath to my daughter (Penny P.
 Moore) my Son, Robert H. Moore (born 1841),
 Moore, Sarah (born 1842), and (Penny P. Moore)
 Norfolk one dollar each, giving to each
 given each of them three hundred dollars.

Item 6th

If when my youngest children (Penny P.
 Moore) become of age and they and my wife,
 Martha H. Moore, shall receive three
 thousand dollars each at their distribution
 portion of my estate, and their share
 be any surplus I wish it equally divided
 between them and my children, my
 friend, in Item No. 6, share alike.

Item 7th

I appoint my son Robert H. Moore and
 my son in law John B. Hattaway, executor

of the last Will and Testament
