NO important question has yet occupied the attention of Congress, since the passing of the Embargo bill.

The Nashville Whig Extra of 17th December, gives a letter from Col. Bowyer, commanding at Mobile, stating that a British squadron of seven sail, with 200 troops and two bomb vessels, had arrived at Pensacola—every exertion was making to defend Mobile and the Point, should the enemy attempt an attack.

It is stated that our army have evacuated Fort George, after demolishing the works and spiking the British Cannon.
