present on Saturday the Eighth day of November. one
thousand Eight hundred and fifty Six at the residence
of John Hutchinson a married man. Before and at
the time he died. About six hours before his death
in perfect possession of his mental faculties he
called upon us to remember and take notice of
what he was about to say. that it was his desire
to make a will. but his feeble situation was
considered by us as a barrier to his signing a
will. he then consented to make a non-competition
will which reads as follows. That his wife
Malinda Hutchinson should have and hold

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all his property both real and personal during her natural life. after her death he wished said property both real and personal to be divided equally among his children and that the portion of said property falling to his daughter be entailed upon them and the heirs of their body. That he appointed as his Executors. Ransom Parham Malinda Hutchinson and Andrew J. Lemax.
