

The Last Will & Testament of Robert
Date of said County

Sept. 6th 1866

Georgia
Dougherty County } Being now advanced in years
and cannot expect to be here
many more years on earth and
wishing whilst in proper mind to make some dis-
position of my little property as I may have left
dying to my wish and desire thereof

First

I wish all my perishable property to be sold
my place where I now live and the land attached
the net proceeds of which I wish to be for the dis-
charge of my debt. My Negroes to be hired and
until my Estate can be settled up and if the
property directed to be sold is not sufficient for
the discharge of my debt the hire of the Negroes
used for that purpose. I further desire that a
decent Tomb Stone shall be placed at the grave
of my daughter Mary Ellen and a grave marker
with iron plate and a grave stone placed at
the grave of my deceased son Francis E. Lundy

Second

I Will and bequeath to my Granddaughter Mary Ellen
Lundy all the Pi Pas against her Father's
Estate that has been purchased and transferred
me said Pi Pas I wish levied against a
Negro boy named Dennis belonging to said Estate
and if sold at a reasonable price to be paid
for said grand child. I also Will and bequeath
her a Negro man named Henry Dorey and
should the said Mary Ellen die leaving
child or children the said property to her
My other heirs

Third

I Will and bequeath to my son M. L. Lundy
as trustee for my children the my Negro
Negro Bill and further said Negroes and
sold by him or subject to his will
in any other way he may think
proper and to maintain and
live and at his death

child or children living they said negroes to be divided between my other heirs

Fifth I Will and bequeath unto my son William E. Sunday two negroes Allen & Jeffery in trust to him for any children he may have with the same restrictions and privileges and like divisions as in bequest to my son M. Lin

Sixth I Will and bequeath unto my son in law J. F. Debraffensica in trust to him for his wife and children (Annie Rebecca his wife & her children) two negroes Titus and Piny

Seventh I Will and bequeath unto my son Robert J. Sunday in trust to him for any children he may have two negroes Sam and Jesse under the same restrictions rights and divisions as will be seen in the third and fourth bequests

Eighth I Will and bequeath unto my daughter Mary Josephine two negroes Scott and Sam to be in trust to any husband she may have not to be subject to his debt or to be sold by him but to be used as he may think best for his wife the said Mary Josephine and her children

Ninth I Will and bequeath unto Catharine S. Sunday (my daughter) two negroes Henry and his brother Daniel in trust to any husband she may have under like restrictions & privileges as will be seen in the seventh bequest to my daughter Mary Josephine

Tenth I Will and bequeath unto my daughter Jane E. Sunday two negroes George Adalga Lister & Ida and their future increase under the same restrictions and privileges as in the two last bequests

Eleventh After furnishing my two youngest daughters with two black and provisions for the same

the balance of my household furniture
bequeath unto my wife Ann Jones

I nominate and appoint my cousin S. P. D. Warren as
and my worthy young friend S. P. D. Warren as
to this my last will and Testament.
