Elbert County } I Eleanor Worrill being sick and infirm in body, but of sound mind do hereby

make and publish this is my last will & Testament
 It is my will that my debts be paid
 I give and bequeath to my son in law Calvin F. Wilhight, in trust, for his wife Mary A. and her children one negro man named Charles, about fifty years old, and such of my household furniture as she may desire to take after my death, and one cow of her choice
 I give and bequeath to my son Thomas C. Worrell and his heirs, one negro woman named Eliza about sixteen years old, my stock of hogs and one mule, together with my interest, which is the one eighth part of the tract of land on which I now live, and the crop of every kind now growing.
 All the balance of my estate I wish to be divided equally between all my children or their legal heirs
 I hereby constitute and appoint my son in law Calvin F. Wilhight as my Executor to carry into effect this my last will & Testament

In the name of God Amen.

I James Tearley of the State of Georgia and County of Elbert being of advanced age but of sound mind and memory do make this my last will and Testament in a manner and form following:

- 1st I desire and direct that all my just debts be paid without delay by my Execution hereinafter named
- 2^d My will and desire is that all my property both real and personal be divided into seven equal parts in manner and form following:-
- 3^d To the Children of my deceased daughter Martha W. Tearley I give and bequeath one seventh of my Estate both real and personal to them and their heirs forever to be kept by Thomas J. Tearley in Trust for said children until the youngest arrives of mature age and then to be equally divided between the children of said deceased daughter to them and their heirs forever
- 4th I will to the children of my daughter Lucy H. Adams wife of Lawrence M. Adams one seventh part of my Estate both real and personal to be held by the said Lawrence M. as Trustee until the youngest child becomes of age. at which time said Trustee will divide said part of my property equally between the children of my said daughter Lucy H. to them and their heirs forever
- 5th I give to my daughter Pessilla Hunt wife of Willis Hunt one seventh part of my estate both real and personal to her and her heirs forever
- 6th I give and bequeath to my daughter Phronissa Johnson wife of Malcolm M. Johnson one seventh part of my estate both real and personal to her and her heirs forever
- 7th I give and bequeath to my daughter Dorella Ann Tearley wife of John E. Tearley one seventh of my of my estate both Real and personal to her and her heirs forever
- 8th I give and bequeath to my son Beverly M. Tearley one seventh part of my estate both real and personal to him and his heirs forever
- 9th I give to my son James B. Tearley one seventh part of my estate both real and personal to him and his heirs forever.
- 10th It is my will and desire that my little grand daughter Eliza Livonia Pessilla Catherine Tearley, daughter of my deceased daughter Martha W. Tearley have in addition to her portion with the balance of her brother and sister above named. one feather bed and furniture, one bridle and saddle and two hundred dollars in cash. this to be made out of the undivided estate. and I appoint Thomas J. Tearley Trustee of the same to be
