James Clark's Will 1845

In the name of God Amen. I James Clark of the County of Elbert and
State of Georgia being in sound mind but much afflicted in body and calling
to mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it is appointed for all
mankind once to die do make and ordain this my last will and
Testament. Amplewise. It is my will that after my death my body be
decently buried and as touching such worldly goods as it has been
pleased God to bless me with I do give and devise in the following
manner and form. It is my will that all my just debts be paid.
I do give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Flora Clark all my
property both real and personal to be managed and controlled by
my executors for the mutual support of my wife and children and the
advancement of my estate. It is also my will that if my wife should
marry before all my children come of age in that event I leave it
discretionary with my executors if they should think fit for the best to
sell of my estate and equally divide the proceeds between my wife
and children and in the event she should not marry it is my will
that at her death any estate both real and personal be sold and
equally divided amongst all my children and as my children come
of age or marry they receive such part of my estate as my executors
may think proper to be considered as a part of their portion of my estate
at the final division. I do hereby nominate and appoint my wife
Flora Clark my executors and Elbert Brown and James E. Brown
my executors to this my last will and Testament giving them full power
and authority to manage my estate in any manner they may best to
promote the peace and happiness of my wife and children and th-

advancement of my estate, and I do hereby revoke and disannul all former wills, ratifying this my last will and Testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this day 28th of May 1844.

I give unto my wife Jane Hansard thirty acres of land no or less it being the tract whereon I now live I also give unto her of my household and kitchen furniture to dispose of as she shall think proper
