

Whereupon it is considered adjudged & decreed by the Court that the said Will of William Hester do stand as such and the same is hereby admitted to be recorded as the true last Will & Testament of the said William Hester deceased. And it is further ordered that said Will be sent back to the Court of Ordinary of Elbert County for record. And such other proceeding as the law in such case provides. And that the Executors recover of the Executors the sum of Twenty seven dollars & fifty cents for their costs in this behalf laid out & expended & the Executors be in Mercy of Judgment signed this 22nd March 1854 - Robert Hester

Jesse Ozley's Will 1854
State of Georgia In the County of Elbert, Anno.

I, Jesse Ozley of the County and State aforesaid being of sound mind and memory and knowing the uncertainty of life and the certainty of death do make public and ordain this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking and annulling all others heretofore made by me.

Item First - I desire and direct that my body be buried in a decent manner.

Item Second - I desire and direct that all my just debts be paid by my Executors herein named.

Item the Third - I give and devise to my wife Elizabeth Ozley all of my estate both real and personal of every description during her life.

Item Fourth - I give and bequeath to my son Maria Ozley one negro man by the name of Jack and one hundred dollars the money to be paid at the death of my wife.

Item Fifth - I give and bequeath to my son John Ozley one negro man by the name of George and the said Jesse Ozley is to control and manage said negro only as trustee for my daughter Sarah Wyo and one third of my property except my land and negro is to be managed by said John Ozley as Trustee for Sarah Wyo.

Item Sixth - I give and bequeath to my son Thomas Ozley one negro boy by the name of Miles and eighty acres of land which he now lives at the death of his mother.

Item Seventh - I give and bequeath to my son John Ozley one negro woman by the name of Eliza and eighty acres of land which

he now lies at the death of his mother.

Item Eight - I give and bequeath to my daughter Lilly Lomax one negro woman by the name of Fanny and one third of all the balance of my property except my land and negroes at the death of her mother.

Item the Ninth - I give and bequeath to my son Jesse Oyley the tract of land I now live on and one negro girl by the name of Ann and one negro boy by the name of Charles, at the death of his mother.

Item Tenth. I give and bequeath to my son Sydney Oyley two negro boys by the name of Sam and Martin at his mother's death.

Item Eleventh - I give and bequeath to my daughter Emily Parrot one negro girl by the name of Sam and one third of all the balance of my property except my land and negroes at the death of her mother.

Item Twelfth - I give and bequeath to my grandson William A Hall one negro boy by the name of Robin when he arrives at the age of twenty one and appoint Jesse Oyley as Trustee.

Item Thirteenth - I constitute and appoint my son Jesse Oyley and Sophia Parrot my Executors to this my last will and Testament this twenty seventh of September 1853.

In the name of God Amen.

I, William Adams of the State and County aforesaid being in full health but of sound and disposing mind and memory do make and publish this my last Will and Testament hereby revoking all other wills by me heretofore made. First of all I assign and give into the hands of God who gave it and my body to be buried in a Christian like manner, and as touching my worldly estate that it has pleased God to bless me with I dispose of in the following manner.

Item 1st My will is that all of my just debts be paid.

Item 2nd My will that my son Osborn G. Adams have one horse worth fifty dollars; and one saddle, bridle, and saddle blanket worth fifteen dollars.

Item 3rd My will is that my daughter Rody A. Adams have one cow and calf worth twelve dollars.

Item 4th My will is that the remainder of my property of every description both real and personal be and remain in the possession of my beloved wife Sarah Adams during her natural life or widowhood.

Item 5th My will is that after the death of my wife in case she shall not marry that my Executors hereafter to be appointed sell all of my property and divide the proceeds thereof equally between all of my children equally share and share alike.

Item 6th My will is that in case my wife shall marry that my Executors sell all of my property and divide the proceeds thereof equally between my wife Sarah Adams and all of my children each to share and share alike.
