 dollars. the above bequeathed property to remain in
 the hands of my son Uriah O. Tate til the said
 Enos A. Tate becomes of age without my son
 Uriah O. Tate paying any here for the above
 property. also if Enos A. Tate should die before he
 arrives at the age of twenty one years old or has
 not a lawful heir of his body then the above
 property to be Uriah O. Tate's!

All the rest of my property real and personal I give
 and bequeath unto my beloved son Uriah O. Tate
 and I nominate and appoint Uriah O. Tate and
 Thomas J. Heard my Executors to this my will.
