State of Georgia In the name of God Amen
County of Elbert I William Ward of said County being of sound mind
& disposing memory and being desirous of disposing of my property
as hereinafter mentioned do make, ordain, constitute & appoint this my last
Will and Testament hereby revoking & annulling all other Wills & Testaments
heretofore made by me: First, I hereby give and bequeath unto my daughter
Sally W. Haley all the tract of land whereon I now live lying on the North
side of Cold Water Creek with all appurtenances thereto belonging, also
four negroes now in my possession that is Daniel and Anthony, Men,
Niggin a boy and Hannah a woman, also my household & kitchen furniture
all bedding which I may have at the time of my death & also one horse -
Item second, I give & bequeath unto my daughter Nancy Butler that part or
portion of the tract of land whereon I now live which lies on the South side
of Cold Water Creek - The remainder of my property of which I may die
seized and possessed I wish and will to be equally divided amongst all my
children then living and the children of those that now are or may then be
decease after paying all my just debts funeral expenses and other necessary
expenses of my estate, And lastly I do hereby constitute and appoint
William Buffington and William R. Haley Executors of this my last

Will and Testament - I further state that my object and the motive which induced me herein to leave and give to my daughter Sally more than my other children is to make her share equal to what I have heretofore given the others & to compensate her for having stayed with and taken care of me & attended to my business & household affairs. I, Esse Ogleby of the County

and State aforesaid being of sound mind and memory and knowing the uncertainty of life and the certainty of death do make publish and ordain this my last Will and Testament hereby, writing and annulling all others heretofore made by me.
Item First - I desire and direct that my body be buried in a decent manner.

Item Second - I desire and direct that all my just debts be paid by my Executors herein appointed.

Item the Third - I give and devise to my wife Elizabeth Ogleby all of my estate both real and personal of every description during her life.

Item Fourth - I give and bequeath to my son David Ogleby one negro man by the name of Buck and one hundred dollars the money to be paid at the death of my wife.

Item Fifth - I give and bequeath to my son Esch Ogleby one Negro man by the name of George, and the said Esch Ogleby is to control and manage said negro only as trustee for my daughter Sarah Wyo and one third of my property except my land and negro is to be managed by Esch Ogleby as Trustee for Sarah Wyo.

Item Sixth - I give and bequeath to my son Thomas Ogleby one Negro boy by the name of Miles and eighty acres of land whom he now lives at the death of his mother.

Item Seventh - I give and bequeath to my son John Ogleby one negro woman by the name of Eliza and eighty acres of land whom
