 Will and Testament, in manner and form following,
 that is to say - 1st after all my Just lawful debts are
 fully paid, I give and bequeath to my nephew Jackson
 Hays a certain tract of land I drew myself in my
 own name in Wayne County, second district, first
 number, containing four hundred & ninety acres,
 also two hundred & sixty acres of land adjoining the

Elizwell, Nicholas Swell, lying in the State & County aforesaid, on of North Fork Broad River & also three hundred acres of land more or less, in the State & County aforesaid, being the balance of a survey of nine hundred and ninety nine acres, Originally granted to Peter Williamson, adjoining George King, Perry King, & Michael Tullis, on the Water of Stephens Creek & also a certain negro woman named Hannah about fifty two years of Age, and her increase, also certainly negro girl named Kitty and her poster increase and I give Solina Gorham one Cow, and Jane Gorham one Heifer, Amanda Gorham one Heifer, and Thomas Gorham Bull, &c. I revoke any wills or Wills heretofore by me at any time made, Ordaining, ratifying and publishing this to be my last Will and Testament, Constituting & appointing Jackson Hays and Dennis Phillips to be my sole Executors to this my last Will and Testament. In Witness whereof, I the said Samuel Phillips have hereunto set my hand and seal this 25th day of February in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred & thirty, in presence of us -

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In the name of God, Amen, I John Bellamy of the County of Franklin & State of Georgia, being weak in body, but of perfect mind & memory, thanks be to God, calling to mind the mortality of my Body, & knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make & ordain, this my last will & testament, that is to say, principally & first for all, I give & recommend my Soul into the hands of Almighty God that gave it, and my Body to the Earth, to be buried in decent Christian Burial, at the discretion of my Executors; nothing doubting but at the General resurrection, I shall receive it again by the mighty power of God.

And as touching such worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God, to bless me with, I give & dispose of in the following manner, (to wit) First I give & bequeath to my beloved wife Lucy Bellamy four negroes (to wit) Jack, Sim, Tildy & Suddah, the plantation whereon I now live, together with my stock of all kinds, plantation tools, household & kitchen furniture, during her natural life or widowhood — Secondly I give & Bequeath to my son William Bellamy, one hundred twenty eight & one fourth acres of land whereon he now lives, it being one half of a tract of land belong to me, by one nail's creek, joining John Lober & Weatherock, originally granted to John Turmon, also one young negro man named Granville —

Thirdly, I give & bequeath to my son Nicholas Bellamy two dollars he having had his part herebefore —
Fourthly, I give & bequeath to my son John Bellamy one hundred & fifty acres more or less, it being all that
