Item 5<sup>th</sup>, It is my wish and desire that Thirty-five dollars be paid  
to the Revd C. H. Oneill for the use of his School in Atlanta.  
Item 6<sup>th</sup>, I give and bequeath to my kind friend Mrs. Mary Cannon  
Fifty dollars.

Item 7<sup>th</sup> To my beloved Sister Mary Agnes, to you, to you all and dearest  
the half of my Street House on White Flint Street, Haverhill the South  
half now occupied by J. Alexander as a Druggist and Dr. Hanan  
as law Officer.

Item 8<sup>th</sup> also give and bequeath to my aforesaid Sister Mary two lots lying of said being in the City of Atlanta bounded of the Oldman investigator in the Green Estate containing of Two acres more or less.

Item of the money between brother Edwin Middlehoff and me and  
beginning the North building my house there in Little Shatto Street, has  
occupied his & my mind ever since his induction and continuing during  
his life and at his death, it is my fault and I am glad that his children  
should have it share and share alike.

At 10<sup>th</sup> inst. he and brother Lewis and Mr. C. G. Agius began  
the house and kitchen. That morning about 10 o'clock together the  
three brothers and their son the late Mr. G. L. Agius, went to the

I now, therefore, do make and publish my last will and testament  
in the presence of Andrew S. Brewster, and I desire

I need hardly say I am now ill, but a witness  
is wanted and I desire the Testament in the presence of
