 Green County I Joseph C Maddox being of full health but some mind I being do make this my last will and Testament revoking all others by me heretofore made and I will that my wife Patsy Maddox shall keep in possession all my Estate both real & personal during her widowhood to be managed & controlled by her as her prudence and judgement may direct But should my wife after my death marry again I will that she receive one third part of my Estate to be by her kept during her natural life the other two thirds to be equally divided among my three surviving Children from the estate proceeds of which she they are to be educated and at the death of my wife that part of my Estate in her possession to revert to my three surviving Children and be disposed of as the other two thirds. I do hereby constitute and appoint my wife Patsy Maddox and my son Wm C Maddox when he becomes of age to execute this my last will & Testament

Edward Woodhams Will

Georgia Greene County In the name of God Amen I Edward Woodham of said County being old and infirm and calling to mind the uncertainties of human life do make & ordain this to be my last will and Testament. I commit my body to the dust to be decently buried at the discretion of my Executors and my soul to God who gave it; And as to my worldly Estate real & personal I do hereby devise and bequeath it in the following manner.

- 1st I give and bequeath to my wife Hannah Woodham for and during her natural life two negroes Samuel and Amy and one bed and furniture of which she is to have the sole & entire possession Control & benefit; and at her death my will and desire is that said negroes bed & furniture be sold by my Executor & the proceeds equally divided among my Children; if any of my children shall before my said wife then the part or share of the proceeds of said property to which such child would be entitled shall go to be divided equally among such Children as he or she may leave at the time of his or her death.
- 2nd My will and desire is that the remainder of my personal Estate be sold as soon after my death as it can be legally done and that my real Estate be also sold agreeably to law; but should it appear that my land cannot be sold without a considerable sacrifice my Executors are at liberty to postpone the sale thereof till such time as they in their discretion may deem most for the interest of my Estate.
- 3rd Out of the proceeds of my Estate I wish all my just debts paid with as little delay as may comport with the interest of the same; and the residue hereof to be disposed of in the following manner;

Amount of One hundred & Eighty Dollars, and having given her only about thirty Dollars I request it that my Executors pay to her one hundred and forty Dollars for the purpose of placing her on an equality with the rest of my Children. My will then is that the residue be divided into seven equal parts, but inasmuch as I have been compelled to pay one hundred Dollars for my son James Woodham in addition to the property which I had previously given him I wish that sum deducted from his share, and divided equally among the other six parts with this deduction his part is to be paid to him and one equal seventh part with its proportional part of the said hundred Dollars is to be paid to each of my other sons Cornell & Barrett and to my daughter Polly Ann Hightower, Sophia, Belle & Melinda Woodham. All the other seventh part I give and bequeath to my daughter Ann Daniel and such children as they may have living at the time of their death; but the same is to remain in the hands of my qualified Executor or Executors or Trustees for the said Ann Daniel & such children as she now has or may hereafter have and said Trustees are hereby directed to make such payments and appropriations of the part of my Estate so as last aforesaid devised to may in their discretion appear most for the benefit of my said daughter & her children. It should any of my said Children die before myself then my will is that the part or share of my Estate to which such Child would be entitled shall not be paid to their Children equally; but should any of my Children die without children living at the time of their death then their parts shall be divided among my surviving Children.

3rd I do hereby appoint my sons Cornell Woodham and my friend George W Foster Executors of this my last will and Testament. In testimony of all which I have hereunto set my hand & seal this twentieth day of June one thousand eight hundred & twenty five

I Elizabeth Brown of the County of State aforesaid being sound in mind & memory do make constitute & ordain this my last will & Testament to wit Item 1st I give and devise to my daughter Elizabeth Hale one negro boy called John Jones to her and her heirs forever.

Item 2nd I give and devise to my daughter Polly Hale one negro woman Isaac to her & her heirs forever
 Item 3rd I give and devise to my daughter Nancy P Brown one negro woman Amy & one brother her husband called her on said said daughter paying me the sum of thirty Dollars for the bed & furniture all of which I give to her & her heirs forever.

Item 4th I give & devise to my daughter Christy Jane Brown one negro woman Lucy this future increase also one feather bed and bed furniture called her on her pay thirty Dollars to my heirs
