Georgia. To all whom it may concern. I George Dawson  
green banister son of the County & State aforesaid being of  
sound disposing mind have this day concluded to make my last  
will Testament hereby giving & disposing of all my estate both real  
& personal in the following manner to wit.

First. In the event of my wife Ruth being in life at the time  
of my death I hereby give her all my house hold kitchen  
furniture four choice horses four choice cows & calves a choice  
pair of oxen my cargo I barne has many bags as she may re-  
quire & the remainder of my stock or every description also six  
negroes Estey Darney Linda Pat Tom & Peter to have & to hold  
all said property for covering her natural life I also give unto my  
wife a life estate in that portion of land which I have this day  
given to my said son William L. Dawson by a deed of gift together  
with my dwelling house I hereby give my said wife full power  
hereby to make any arrangement with my said son in  
relation to the use & cultivation of said land after her death  
the crop which may be on or growing on said land shall vest  
in my said son William L. Dawson in consideration of the care  
of said land I should be to dead in his legal representation  
And I also give unto my said wife at the time of my death

One hundred barrels of best fifteen hundred pounds of bacon  
or two thousand pounds of pork the thousand weight of butter  
Second. I enjoin unto my son-in-law David L. Webster all the  
wool & general stock which I have hitherto given him I do  
also give unto the said David L. his heirs an equal proportion  
of all the negroes which are not specially disposed in this  
will at the time of my death

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which I have heretofore given him I also give with him,  
my two are equal proportion of all the negroes which I may have  
at the time of my death but specially disposed of in this will.  
Fifth. I confirm unto my son in law Doctor James Mathew  
the property which I have heretofore given him & I also give  
unto my son Thomas & William C. Dawson as trustees an equal  
proportion of all the negroes not specially given away in this will  
that I may have at the time of my death or the use benefit  
maintenance education & support of my Daughter Elizabeth Hau-  
mey & her children & thereby require of my said sons Trustees as  
aforesaid to retain the contract agreement of said negroes for  
purposes aforesaid as may seem best in their discretion & further  
require of them to give to the children of my said daughter as  
they may be or come of age what they may deem just & right under  
the circumstances that may then exist.

Sixth. I confirm unto my son in law James H. Greene the property  
which I have heretofore given him I also give unto my sons Thos.  
& William C. Dawson as trustees for my daughter Ruth & Greene  
an equal proportion of all the negroes which I may have at the time  
of my death & which are not specially disposed of in this will for  
the use benefit support maintenance & education of my said daughter  
Ruth & her children should she hereafter have any & thereby require  
of my said sons trustees as aforesaid to use controul & care of said negroes  
in that manner they may deem most advantagous for the persons  
unblessed in this world I should my said daughter die leaving no  
child in life It is my will that such negroes shall be equally divided  
between my first sons Thomas John Hunter George & William C. Dawson  
I should my said daughter die having a child or children two  
child or children should before he or they become twenty one years old  
it is my desire that such negroes be equally divided among my five  
sons aforesaid or their legal representatives

Seventh. I confirm unto my five sons Thomas John Hunter George  
William C. Dawson with the property left me I personal which  
have heretofore given them respectively I also give unto them  
each an equal proportion of all my negroes which I may have at  
the time of my death but specially disposed of in this will to the  
& their heirs forever I also desire that every thing which I have  
given in the first part of my will to my wife during her natural  
life shall after her death be equally divided among my five sons  
aforesaid or their legal heirs or representatives with the reservation  
hereinafter mentioned & it is further my will to state that all my estate  
both real & personal in fact is not otherwise disposed of at the time  
of my death that there be equally divided among my five sons or  
their legal representatives

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Seventh. I give unto my grandson George Anderson Dawson  
a little negro girl by the name of Hannah the child of  
Casper I should be ten before twenty one years of age and negro  
is to belong to my son George

Eighth. Should there during the time that myself or crops may  
be on hand. I will dispose of by my will I desire that my  
executors immediately sell said crop or crops in the manner  
they may think best. I pay off my debts should any there  
be & the remainder if any left be equally divided amongst  
my sons then as John, Ruben, George William C. Dawson &  
their legal representatives

Ninth. I hereby constitute Casper my eldest & youngest son  
Thomas William C. Dawson my executors to carry into effect  
this my last will & testament.

*Codicil to the foregoing*

Georgia - I George Dawson of the  
Greene County - County State aforesaid  
do make & publish this Codicil to my last will & testament in manner  
following (that is to say) I give to my wife Ruth my negro man  
Jack (blacksmith) in place of the negro woman <sup>with name</sup> Lurida which I gave  
to her in my last will & testament I also give in addition to what  
I gave her in my last will my self blacksmith tools & as many  
working tools of every description of every description as she may require  
for the use of her farm I also give my wife Ruth two small negroes  
one a boy & a girl children of Casper which is to be disposed  
of among my five sons after the death of my wife as directed by  
the said first clause of my last will I also all the future increase  
of the said negroes (Casper, Casper & Ruth & also girls only)  
Ruth in addition to what I have bequeathed in my said last will  
for her maintenance eight bushels clean cotton weighing at least three  
hundred pounds each. You know by the first clause of my last will  
I bequeath the crop or crops that might be on hand at the death  
of my wife to my son William C. Dawson but not being satisfied with  
that bequeath my will I desire is that it be divided equally between  
my five sons or their legal representatives together with all the other  
properly increased accumulation which may be at the death of  
my wife in pursuance of the first clause of my said will And  
to know by the first clause of my last will I gave to my son William  
C. Dawson my sword & scabbard but he will not move to it  
my desire is that my five sons should occupy it after the death

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of my wife & therefore give the said dwelling house to my son George with liberty to remove it for his own residence provided the land can be levied & laid off as to include the said dwelling on his part, I do hereby will & declare that my said tract of land which I now have containing nine hundred acres more or less shall be equally divided according to quantity (not taking into view the quality) this division to be governed in every instance by a deed of Gift except as above declared between my three sons Robert George & William & David or their legal representatives. And whereas by my last will I testame I give unto my servant David Mcintosh his heirs an equal portion of all my negroes which are not specially disposed of by this will at the time of my death I do hereby confirm unto the said McIntosh all the property both real & personal together with the increase that I have heretofore given him. But I do hereby order & declare that my will is that I give unto my sons Thomas & William Dawson as trustees for my grand children sons & daughters of the said David McIntosh (to wit) Leslie Daniel Lucy Ann Nancy George & Dawson David Crosby Paximade Thornton McIntosh all that part of the negroes which I gave to my son in law David McIntosh the heir by the latter part of the second clause of my will it being an equal portion of all the negroes not specially disposed of that is to say one ninth part & my request is that my said sons Thomas & William & Dawson trustees as aforesaid use the said property at their own discretion to the best advantage for the benefit of said children & I further order that either of said children die before they come of age or marry their portion or part shall vest in & become the property of the remaining ones. I hereby require of any said sons to give an equal proportion as the case of age I give unto my daughter George Marion Dawson son of George Dawson for a small boy by the name of Buffe son of all in the place of me I give him in the seventh clause of my will that one being dead I also will I declare that my daughter Ruth Green shall have an equal part of my household furniture with my five sons that is to say one sixth part this I bequeath unto my said daughter Ruth Green & no other person or persons I also declare that it is my will I desire that my son George have my corner clock but the value to be deducted out of his proportionable part of the household furniture. I did I also wish the fine house & all belonging thereto to remain for the use of my wife during her life & the same to belong & remain on the land after her death.
