Greene County & mind (and) memory do make known this my last will
Item 1st I will that all my just debts be pay in the manner ^{hereafter} pointed out immediately after
the gathering in of the Crop now growing there shall be exposed to public sale at twelve
months credit, the present Crop of Cotton, one forty saw gin together with the
surplus of last years Crop of Cotton Corn & Oats one big One negro man named
Jacob one negro boy named Joe five feather beds with furniture (and) as much of
of the household (and) Kitchen furniture, also as many Cattle as my wife (and)
my Executors may think can be spared

Item 2nd I will that my wife Elizabeth Pattillo my daughters Elizabeth and
Martha (and) my son James Pattillo (should) live on my land, until my son
James becomes of age under the superintendence of my son George H & Charles F. Pattillo
Item 3rd, when my son James Pattillo becomes of age the two negro boys (Nuck
(and) Jacob to be sold (and) the money arising therefrom to be appropriated for the
use of the Estate to the best Advantage as the Executors may think

Item 4th I give my wife Elizabeth (and) my two daughters Elizabeth (and) Martha
each one (and) furniture also I will that my wife Elizabeth should retain in
her possession a negro woman named Nancy during her lifetime and at her
death the (said) negro woman to be sold, making & divided making an equal
share to each of my Children with what some of my Children have heretofore
received

Item 5th I Commit the charge (and) Education of my son James to George
H. and Charles F. Pattillo (and) also ordain George H. Pattillo and Charles F.
Pattillo my lawful Executors this 1st July 1826
