I Robert Gilliam of the State of Georgia and County of Greene do hereby make this my last Will and Testament.
In the first place I desire that all my just debts be paid
Secondly I give (and bequeath) to my wife Sarah Gilliam all my property both real (and personal) except eight negroes (viz) two to Polly Bassett due to Joseph C. Madden due to Tom Williamson (and) due to George Williamson which negroes my wife Sarah Gilliam has the knowledge of naming which are to be sold out one to her taken away in two days after my death.

4th I will my Executors and hereby authorize them (after giving off my wife her choice bed & furniture) to make sales in the most (advantageous) manner of all the Balance of my Estate both real (and) personal for the purpose of making a distribution of the same among my heirs but wish them first before they make any division of the proceeds of my Estate to pay all my just debts of my Estate

5th I do hereby make (and) ordain my wife Sarah the lawful Guardian of my

Bed furniture & Bedsteads also one Red Trunk

Fifth I give and bequeath to Mary Eleanor Hodge one negro Girl named Waine

Sixth I give (and) bequeath to my beloved Niece Charly Lepine one Mahogany
Knife Case (and) Knives therein and one pair plated Candlesticks

Seventh I give (and) bequeath unto my beloved Niece Leonitia Posty one plated
Tea Pot and Tea Caddie, as a remembrance of our ancient friendship to be sent
to her mother to keep for me and in remembrance of her never returning to
