Thomas Fambroughs Will

In the name of God Amen. I Thomas Fambrough of Great County & Sent being of sound & disposing mind & memory do make & Ordain this to be my last will & Testament revoking all others in manner following to wit

First I give and bequeath unto my beloved son Anderson Fambrough five Dollars and all my wearing apparels above what I have heretofore given him

Then I give and bequeath to my beloved daughter Elizabeth Bart a negro girl named Mary over and above what I have heretofore given her

Then I give and bequeath to my grand daughter Sally Bart a negro girl named Eliza

Then I give and bequeath to my beloved son Thomas Fambrough Quat a negro woman named Hannah and her two children Nancy & Omanuel over and above what I have heretofore given him

Then I give and bequeath to my son William Fambrough one dollar in addition to what I have heretofore given him

Then I give and bequeath to my grand son Thomas Fambrough son of <sup>William</sup> Lewis a negro boy named Lewis

Then I give and bequeath to the lawful heirs of my son Willie to be equally divided among them two negro men Joe & Jack

Then I give to my beloved and affectionate wife Cary Fambrough a negro man named Jesse and his wife Daphne and all the household furniture & stocks & plantation etc to be kept by her during her widow hood or until my two younger daughters Abigail & Eliza or either of them marry or become of age but if she marry or either of <sup>the</sup> children marry then it is to be equally divided between the three except the two negroes above named which remain the property of the above named Cary. It is further more my will and desire that my <sup>wife</sup> named wife Cary keep profession of the said religion I own live to the negro

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herein after together to my two youngest children during her or her husband but  
when she marry the land to be equally divided between her and the two children  
and they have the negro settled to them

Item I give and bequeath to my two daughters Elizabeth & Elena, Isaac, Edmund  
among their children to be equally divided between them when either marry  
or become of age and it is my will and desire that they receive a decent English  
education and in case either should die without issue the success will be  
settled to the negro named in this bequest

Item It is my will and desire that of the property left to my two youngest  
children should be out a residing condition that it be taken into the management  
of my son Thomas & Anderson

Item I do hereby nominate & appoint my beloved wife Mary & my son Thomas  
& Anderson my Executors my liege & Executors In testimony whereof I have set  
my hand and affix my seal this 13<sup>th</sup> day of April 1827

Georgia (Green County) The last will and Testament of John Holt late of Green County dec'd who died on the tenth of September 1826

Georgia (Green County) Court of Ordinary January Term 1827  
The foregoing recitation or statement of the Municipal Will of John Holt late of said County &c. being  
now in question open Court by Mary Holt widow of said dec'd &c. and a caveat against the probate thereof having  
been filed by Samuel P. Guin & others. The witnesses thereto were severally examined and it appearing that the recitation of the law had been fully  
completed with. It is ordered and considered by the Court that the contents of said recitation or statement be taken and regarded as the  
last will and Testament of said John Holt dec'd. It that the same be & be committed to records as such.

Superior Court, at which time the Special Jury by their verdict confirmed the above with order of John Holt & Rule No. 21. on the
