In the name of God Amen

I William Lamourford of the county of Greene and State of Georgia, do make Publish and declare this to be my last Will and Testament, Resolving all others heretofore made, in manner and form following to wit:-

I lend to my wife Delilah during her life her Negroes by name, Lucy Lewis, Dick, Lodge, Black, Blah, together with my House and Land - House hold and Kitchen furniture, and all my stock of every kind and all farming utensils of every kind &c -

I give demise and bequath to my son Hardy at my wife's death my Negro man Lewis in addition to property heretofore given him -

I give demise and bequath unto my Daughter Jack my Negro Boy Alfred in addition to property heretofore given her -

I give demise and bequath unto my son William at the death of my wife my Negro Boy Dick in addition to property heretofore given him -

I give demise and bequath unto my Daughter Betsey Ann at the death of my wife my Negro Boy Blah in addition to property heretofore given her -

I give bequath and demise unto my son Joel at the death of my wife Lucy Blah and George and all my lands whereon I now live, in Greene County I suppose to be three hundred acres more or less my addition to property heretofore given him -

It is further my Will and desire that at the death of my wife all my property which I have not heretofore given be Equally divided among all my children - and lastly

I do hereby nominate and appoint my son Joel L. Lamourford Sole Executor to this my last Will and Testament

Lucy Lewis Will.

In the name of God Amen.

I Lucy Lewis being weak in body but of sound mind and memory do constitute and appoint this to be my last Will & Testament.

And as touching my worldly goods which has pleased God to endow me with, I leave and bequeath in the following manner.

Item 1st
I leave & bequeath to my two Daughters Elizabeth Fitter and Martha Drake two tracts of land and one forty acre lot all of which I drew in the last Land Lottery and one bay Horse and all my house hold and Kitchen furniture &c if the should not agree in dividing the said tracts of land it is to be sold and also the Horse and all the money arising therefrom to be equally divided between them.

Item 2nd

I leave & bequeath to my son Edmunds Lewis ten dollars in money.

Item 3rd

I leave & bequeath to my Daughter Mary Sharp one dollar.

Item 4th

I leave & bequeath to the bodily heirs of my Daughter Nancy Sharp one dollar.

I do hereby constitute and appoint John Fitter and Patrick Drake my lawful Executors to this my last Will & Testament I so witness whereof I have set my hand and seal this 21st day of March 1836.
