Barber led Hall County in Cherokee removal

An original letter on file in Georgia Department of Archives gives information pertinent to Hall County Military.

"Thus, Sir, we have turned nearly one third of our men, who have formed themselves into two Companies, have Elected their Officers (returns of which are sent on) and now await your Orders.

"I was not aware that I should restrict them to the precise number called for — and therefore report them as they are. Remaining very Respectfully, Your Obt Servt. Benjamin Dunagan Col. 44th Regt. G.M." On Reverse: "HALL. Report

from the 44th regiment — two companies raised in lieu of a draft. Whole No. 195. Ordered on file 25 June 1836."
