The John Bell family

Occasionally, a headstone in a cemetery will record such interesting information, it is a challenge to combine data and try to compile a partial-history of this particular family. This was the case of two such graves situated in the Celmons Methodist Chapel Cemetery, located on State Highway 52, Hall County. The entire cemetery was recorded April 7, 1967, by Hoard and Edna Fuller and

myself. In the midst of many graves was a wooden picket fence which enclosed two headstones of rather recent origin, although the deaths-had occurred more than a century ago. These markers had been placed here not too many years past by descendants of the two interred.

But who?

MAJOR JOHN BELL - born Dec. 1, 1792 in Virginia, died Mar. 2, 1850 Hall County, Ga. His wife, NARCISSA

LOCKERT BELL — born April 26, 1801 Chester S.C., died May 4, 1861 Hall County, Ga.

It is not known when John Bell came to Hall County. He is not listed in the 1820 census. Nor is it known if he was a major in the military, or if that is only a name. The wife, Narcissa, has a will recorded in book "A" Wills, Hall County. This document is interesting in that the estate was quite sizable and the children had to return from as far away as Texas for the settlement of the legacy. Pages 166-177

My aged Negro woman, Fanny, has the right of choice to live with any of my children Executors: Sons William R.

William Armor. Witnesses: J.C. Highsmith, Peter Falkner. Signed: Narcissa Bell (a notation had been added, "departed this life 5 May 1861").

In order to probate the will:

"3 June 1861. . admitted to record 7 October 1861. . . request to appear in court first Monday in October to show cause why Will should not be proven. The petition of William R. Bell that Narcissa Bell departed this life possessed of an estate of considerable value and that the left as her heirs at law: John L. Bell, Anderson W. Bell, and Permelia Rylee, wife of Young Rylee, who are now residents of of Texas, W.R. and Madison Bell of Baks County, Ga., Harriett Evens, wife of John F. Evans (evident) second husband), of Jackson County, Ga., and Narcissa Cantrell, wife of Sterling Cantrell, Lumpkin County, Ga., Aaron Bell, Narcissa Thompson, wife of A.J. Thompson, Isaac Rylee, guardian of Mary A., Julia, and James A. Rylee, children of Harriett Rylee, Allen J. Bell, Hall Co
