The 1820 federal census of Hall county enumerates Archibald, Charles and Robert Cockram. The original home of the family was in Scotland and the original spelling was COCH-RANE. The name is now sometimes variously spelled Cockram. Cockrum, Cochran, and Cockerham. The family appears to have moved to South Carolina from Henry County, Va. and descendants later moved to Hall County from Jackson and Oglethorpe Counties.

In 1790, James Cockran lived in Pendleton District and Hezekiah Cockran lived in Greenville District, S.C. By 1800, James Cockran and a John Cochran both were living in the Pickens County are of Pendleton District, S.C., and in Greenville that year were James, Hezekiah, Chesley, Daniel, and two William Cockrum families.
