Important historical data found in church minutes

Genealogical records, migration patterns and history are recorded in musty church minutes of some of the early churches of Hall County. Many times pioneer settlers procrastinated and failed to get land deeds, wills, settlement of estates recorded at the courthouse, but they did attend church. Church membership was important to them. When the family moved from community to community, or from state to state, the church membership was transferred and was so recorded.

Early church records are of such historic value that historians and Archives are constantly seeking these minutes so that they might be microfilmed and preserved for future generations. They record the way of the tows sorneys.

the books were rebound in heavy-duty binding. Most important, however, all the records are now on microfilm at the Archives. Other Hall County church minutes on microfilm are Concord, Cool Springs, Harmony Hall, and Oak Grove. There is no charge for laminating or microfilming. There is a nominal fee for rebinding, the same as charged the Archives. Extracts from early records of Hopewell Church: "April 9, 1825...church met, conference opened as usual. Some Civil War records are found in the Hopewell Minutes: "Saturday, 25th of January 1862. There was a motion and it also recard all the members names that have died and may

have died commencing from last association.

"Whereas God in his all wise Providence has removed from this world to a world of Spirits, our breturen A.P. Vandiver, Robbert Pdson (Paxson) and W.R. Bell all who went as volenteeres to Virginia and died there except Vandiver who returned home and lived a short time. We have therefore resolved to set apart Friday before our next meeting for Prayer to God for army and soldiers and on Sunday we have services in memory of our departed brethren. H.B. Cobb, A.W. Bell and W.R. Howington have been "Whereas God in his all wise W.R. Howington have been appointed as a committee to invite Ministers and notify relatives and friends of the meeting.
