Lockhart family from Virginia

In the northern part of Hall
County there is an old family
burial plot which is most difficult to locate. In an effort to
transcribe all headstone inscriptions of the county for the
then forthcoming publication:
"Tombstone Inscriptions of
Hall County, Ga.," in June,
1968, Marvin and Emma
Lawson went with me to find the
cemetery.

Dean D. Oliver, who lived in
the vicinity, had a few years
prior to our search visited the
burial plot, and he graciously
consented to be our guide. The
small cemetery was located on
the old Lockhart farm, State
Highway and was surrounded by
a pine forest which was so dense

Great Britain, in a company commanded by Capt. Lamar. He became very rich in land and slaves and became a very prominent citizen. Vincent Lockhart (Sr.) represented the county in the General Assembly

county in the General Assembly several terms.

He believed he could employ his capital to better advantage in Augusta and went to that city to engage in merchandising. Instead he met with reverses and returned to Lincoln County and in a few years moved to Hall County in that part which was known as "The Glades." Vincent Lockhart (Sr.) was married to Louisa Owens, daughter of George Owens, a prominent farmer in Elbert County.

Vincent D. Lockhart (Jr.) was raised on a farm, and after

There was a DAR marker alongside the headstone with the information: In Honor of Service in War of 1812.
Mr. Oliver told us that Capt.
Lockhart had requested that he be buried beneath the large oak tree. Louisa, wife of Capt.
Vincent Lockhart, is buried in Clemnon's Chapel Methodist Church Cemetery. She died Feb. 15, 1867, at age 69.
A publication which was located in the Atlanta Library, MEMOIRS OF GEORGIA, gives further information on the family:
"Vincent D. Lockhart (Jr.) vincent D. Lockhart in Elbert County, vincent D. Lockhart in Elbert County, vincent D. Lockhart (Jr.) was raised on a farm, and after receiving a fairly good education at the county schools, went to Atlanta and engaged as a clerk in a drug store. While thus employed he studied medicine. He afterwards located in Hall County where he "established a good reputation and secured a good practice." In 1878 he moved to Homer and his practice covered an extensive area.

Dr. Lockhart was married in 1875 to Miss Nancy Martin, daughter of Joseph M. and Elizabeth Cagle Martin of Hall County in 1849.
Another son of Vincent D. Lockhart Sr., is buried in Clemmons Chapel Methodist Cemetery.
