# Mauldins settled in South Hall

The 1800 census of South Carolina enumerates several by name of Mauldin in Pickens District.

"In Pendleton 1790 were Capt. Blake, John, Joab and Harris Mauldin. A 1799 deed indicates Baalam, Joab and Blake Mauldin were related. Blake and Wesley were living in Greenville District in 1800 and Joab Mauldin was enumerated in Pickens. Blake Mauldin later was in Hall County, Ga."

The Mauldin family was not enumerated in the 1820 census of Hall County; therefore, Blake probably removed to Hall prior to 1830. The family settled between Chestnut Mountain and Flowery Branch, and erected and operated a mill. The first Mauldin marriage recorded in Hall County is dated: Sept. 7, 1820. Mahaly Maulden was married to Thomas Montgomery. John W. Hamilton, J.P. officiated (cert. 62).

The second of "book of Marriages 1840-1870" records the marriage of Lemuel Mauldin to Mary Pirkle, Nov. 5, 1840. According to family records, Lemuel Carroll Mauldin was the son of James "Jimmie" Mauldin and Betsie Ann Lawless. Jimmie and Betsie Mauldin had at least two other sons: Laban and Abbie. There were probably a number of other children born to the couple.

Lemuel Carroll Mauldin was born Jan. 5, 1820, and died Sept. 8, 1882. He is buried in old Mauldin, or as sometimes called Mackey, cemetery located about six miles south of Flowery Branch, Hall County. His first wife, Mary Pirkle Mauldin, was born Sept. 20, 1822 and died Aug. 17, 1884. She is buried in a small plot on top of hill across the creek south of the Mauldin burial plot.

Lemuel Carroll Mauldin's second wife was Nancy (Nan) Lowery. Nan Mauldin is buried in Sardis Church Cemetery which is just across county line in Gwinnett.

Seven sons and three daughters were born to Lemuel Carroll and Mary Pirkle Mauldin: 1. Basil Mauldin, married (1st) Sallie Holman; (2nd) Nancy Hooper. 2. Mannoran Mauldin was eldest son.

He served in Civil War, received gunshot wound in back, was sent home and died soon thereafter. Mannoran is buried alongside his mother, Mary Mauldin. 3. John Mauldin. He married (1st) Mary Frasier, (2nd) Harriet Sanders.

4. Austin Mauldin married Lizzie King. 5. William Columbus Mauldin. He married (1st) M. Narcissis Roberts, (2nd) Ora Brown. Thomas

Mauldin married Mildred Powell. The daughters of Lemuel and Mary Mauldin: Mary Mauldin married Russell Taylor Wofford; Nancy Mauldin married Judson King; Jennette Mauldin married the Rev. Arch Holland.

Lemuel Carroll Mauldin and Nancy Lowery were parents of four sons and three daughters. George Mauldin married Lella Lanford. Henry Mauldin was

married to June Turk, Harrison Mauldin married Martha Hall. The fourth son was Terrell Mauldin.

The daughters of Lemuel and Nan Mauldin were: Octavia Mauldin — she was married to J.D. Turk; Tiny Mauldin married John Clarke, and Emory Mauldin was married to Harrison Phillips.

Many of the Mauldin descendants moved west.

Mahala Mauldin (the first recorded marriage of the family in Hall County) was born Nov. 12, 1802, in South Carolina. She died May 20, 1879, and is buried in Old Liberty Cemetery near Violet Hill, Ark. Herband, Thomas Montgomery, was born Sept. 1794, South Carolina. He died between the years 1877 and 1880 and is buried in Bethesda Campground Cemetery, In-

dependence County, Arkansas.

Other Mauldin marriages recorded in Hall County prior to 1870: "Cert. 628: Feb. 13, 1832. Lucinda Mauldin married William H. Lyon. William Quillin M.G. officiated".

"Nov. 16, 1846, license issued but returned. W.P.A. Timms to Nancey Mauldin. License issued by E.M. Johnson C.C.O."
