 mind that it is ordained for all men One to die
 do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament
 in manner and form following Viz: -

I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Martha Morgan
 one Negro woman Lydia she increase. one Sorrel
 Mare Winifred, one bed and Furniture to her and her
 heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth
 Morgan one Negro girl Leckey she increase, one
 bay horse (Bedford) one bed & furniture to her &
 her heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Blanch Wiley
 Morgan one Negro girl Maria, one Negro boy called
 Prince one bay Shark Coll, bridle & saddle one bed
 & furniture when she arrives at age or marries to
 her & her heirs forever —

Item. I give and bequeath unto my son Simon Morgan
 one Negro man Adow, Sorrel Coll (Anthony) Saddle
 & bridle, one bed & furniture to him and his heirs
 forever —

Item. I give and bequeath unto my son John Ellington
 Morgan one Negro man Jerry, one horse worth
 seventy-five dollars, saddle & bridle, one bed &
 furniture to him and his heirs forever —

Item. I give and bequeath unto my son Thomas Barber
 Morgan one Negro boy called Dick one Negro
 girl ~~Barber~~ ^{Barber} worth seventy-five dollars

Saddle & bridle, one bed & furniture to him and his heirs forever —

Item. I give and bequeath unto my son David Crawley Morgan one negro boy called Hall, one negro girl called Sarah, one horse worth seventy-five dollars, Saddle & bridle one bed & furniture to him and his heirs forever —

Item. I give to my grandson Francis Ellington Lawson Morgan one negro boy called Seth at the decease of my wife to him and his heirs forever —

Item. I lend unto my loving wife Charlotte Morgan the following negroes (to wit) Bob, Bett, Tom, Moses, Wmmy and George and the tract of land I now live on together with all my stock not before devised, the household and kitchen furniture that may remain after my just debts are paid, during her life and after her death to be equally divided between my following children (to wit) Martha, Elizabeth, Sabine, Simon, John, Thomas Barber & David Crawley to them & their heirs forever —

Item. I give unto my son William Sallard Morgan one Cow & half to him & his heirs forever —

Item. My will and desire is that my after named Executors shall make sale of the tract of land on Island Creek and the tract in the third district of Old Wilkinson at three annual installments whenever they think it will bring the best price to be appropriated to the payment of my debts and the surplus if any to be

equally divided among all my children

Item - My will and desire is that my son Wm. J. Morgan shall have an equal share of all the property lent to my wife Charlotte Morgan at her death, with my seven before named children

Item. I constitute and appoint my loving wife Charlotte Morgan my son William J. Morgan and my son Simon Morgan, Executors to this my last will & testament -

In witness whereof I have set my hand this first day of April 1813 -
