

In the name of God Amen. I Elisha Flournoy
of the County of Hancock and State of Georgia
being weak in body but sound in mind and
memory and calling to mind that it is appointed
for all one to die and then the judgement, do
therefore make and Ordain this my last Will
and Testament in the following form and manner
that is to say -

1st I give unto my beloved wife Mary Flournoy
one feather Bed and furniture and her pins Christ
I also leave in the hands of my Executors the
following Negroes to wit a girl named Phibe
a woman Jim a Negro boy named Farthing
and one named Joe for her support during her
life yet nevertheless if the destined Owners shall
think proper to pay her fifty dollars each annu-
ally they shall become the immediate owners of
them my two youngest sons Jacob A. & Laurence
Flournoy.

2nd I give unto my ^{three} eldest daughters Mary Ann,
Phibe and Frances the Negroes with their former
and future increase and all the other property they
have or had in their possession to them, their
heirs and assigns forever -

3rd I lend to my daughter Jenny all the Negroes she
has in her possession during her life and after her
death I give the S^c Negroes with their former
and future increase to be equally divided among
the heirs of her body (if any) and in case she
should have no children I give the property I
loaned her to be equally divided between my son
Peter F. Flournoy, Phibe Will and Frances Pleasant
to them, their heirs and assigns forever -

4.th The property without discrimination that I have given to my five eldest sons and my four daughters is all I intend giving them except my son Daniel to whom I give all the rights I have in a tract of ten acres of land in the State of Virginia adjoining my brother Josiah Hummery call'd the Silver mine, and to my son Peter H, Phibe and Frances the before named loaned Negro, to my daughter Jenny in case she should have no Children -

5.th I give jointly my land in the State of Virginia whereon I lived to my two youngest sons, Jacob A. and Laurend and it is my desire and request that it shall not be sold but ^{be} kept by them in remembrance of them that gave it to me -

6.th I give unto my son Jacob A. one Negro woman named Amey with her former and future increase and one Negro boy Lerry one mare & horse which he has in possession one feather Bed and furniture, one half of my pewter and two Negro boys Harthing and Joe to him his heirs and assigns forever -

7.th I give unto my son Laurend one Negro woman named Easter with her former and future increase also my tract of land whereon I now live and purchase of W. George Gray with the remainder part of my furniture, crop and utensils, Stock of every kind and description also every thing that has not been previously given away to him and his heirs forever. 8th And here I wish to be fully and plainly understood as respects the ~~Money~~ or the annual payment to be made my wife that they shall be considered to be in the hands my Executors but it shall never the less be optional in my two sons Jacob A. and Laurend to keep them by paying the before named sum.

9th In consequence of my bequests to my son Laurend he shall pay all my just debts -

10. Lastly I appoint all my sons Peter A., William, Dant., Jacob A. and Laurend my Executors to this my last Will and Testament being made in my twenty-fifth year ever since the first day of May last, to which I set my hand this 27th of August 1811 -
