Tom, Hubbard, Hal, Randle, Elze, Creasy, Wilkins,
Edward & David together with all my Land, Stocks
of horses, Cattle, Sheep & Hogs, with all my house-
hold & Kitchen furniture & plantation Utensils during
her life or widowhood but when ever my wife
dies or if she should Marry it is my desire that
all my property may be divided equally among
my Children by name Martha B. Wallace Anne
J. Wallace, Rebekah J. Wallace, William W. Wallace
John H. Wallace. Also it is my desire that my
wife if she should live to see my Children grown
that she should give them all a good education
but if she should die before they are grown
that my youngest Children have a sufficiency
reserved to make them an equal education
with the Eldest. Also it is my desire that no
Inventory should be taken of my estate - Also
my desire is that my wife Polly, Wallace & John
Peters be the Executors of this my last will &
testament & now revoking all other Wills -
