Weatherby who are now in life and Dartha Jackson, Isaac Weatherby and James E. F. Weatherby my grand children who are the children of my oldest son Edmund J. Weatherby and to my wife Francis May Jane Weatherby all of my property both real and personal of whatever kind or description, the said Dartha Jackson Isaac Weatherby and James E. F. Weatherby grand children receiving only the one share, that of their deceased father Edmund Weatherby.

This bequest is made to my wife Francis May Jane Weatherby in lieu of dower, but it is my will that she shall receive a reasonable twelve months support after my death.

Item Second: I hereby constitute my son Mathew H. Weatherby Executor of this my last will and testament.
