Georgia In the name of God Amen,
Harris County I Benjamin Walker being sound in both in body
and mind and desirous memory thoughts be given unto me,
and calling to mind the mortality of my body, and that it is
appointed unto all men to die I do make, ordain and constitute
this my last Will and Testament.

I give my soul into the hands of God who gave it, my body
to the Earth to decent burial, nothing doubting I shall live
at the general resurrection by the mighty hand of God.

I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Mahala Bt. Walker
all my lands, Negros and Household & Kitchen furniture and
all my stock of all Kinds with the exception of such a portion
as may be necessary for the payment of my just debts to
remain with her as long as she lives, and as my chil-
dren comes of age or marry it is my desire that they in
desirably have the same amount, that I shall herein name
that has been given to my son James V Walker who is now
deceased; but if my wife should not have sufficient amount
of the different Kinds of property to give to all my children
when they come of age or marry, they the Children must
wait until the death of my wife and then they must
be made equal with my deceased Son James V. Walker
It is my desire that my Executor and Executrix if they to sell
any portion of my property to pay my debts, I wish them to
sell at private sale such property as can be best done
without my wife.

I have given unto my Son James V. Walker, who is now dece-
ased (1852) one hundred and fifty two dollars, which the said
James V. Walker received from me before his death
And after the death of my beloved wife, if there is any property
remaining after making all the Children up, equal with
the amount that my Son James V. Walker receives then
I want an equal division between all my children and
one grand child (namely) William E. Walker, Lucy Ann Walker
Bethany Hamson Hardy the wife of James C. Hardy, Lucy Foster
Walker, Martha E. Walker, Willie W. Walker, Benjamin B.
Walker, Williby H. Walker, and my grand Son James E. Walker
who is the only legal heir to my Estate after the death
of my wife.

I give and bequeath unto my daughter Bethany Hamson
Hardy wife of James C. Hardy and all her children free
from the disposition of her present or any future husband
that portion which she bears from my Estate as her leg-
acy in proportion equal with the rest of my children
I do hereby constitute and appoint my wife Mahala Bt.
Walker Executor and my son William E. Walker Ex-
ecutor of this my last Will and Testament.
