

Last Will and Testament of Clement Pace Sealed Recorded

Harris County I, Clement Pace of said County, being fable in body but sound in mind and discretion and knowing the uncertainty of life, do hereby make publish and declare the following as my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all others by me heretofore made.

Item 1st I will direct that having committed my soul to God the giver of all grace, that my body be decently buried henceforth all my just debts be immediately paid.

Item 2nd I give unto my wife Mary Pace the following negroes to wit: Thom, Ella Ned, Obam, Hester, Caroline and her two children to wit: Eliza Anna, and Martha, Mary Jane and her six children to wit: Barbara, Mary, Anna, Melly, and Gabriel, and Mariah's two children to wit, Henry and Seaborn, it have and to hold to her and her heirs and assigns forever.

Item 3rd I will unto my wife Mary Pace the following negroes to wit during her life the following negroes to wit: Steury the Blacksmith, Young boy, Gustavus, William, Jack Jim, Mary, Adeline, Mariah, Bill and his wife Sizzie, Charita Wilder, Isaac and her children, John and Susanna until their marriage and at her death said negroes with their increase are to you and become the property of my Brother Etannah Pace his heirs and assigns forever.

Item 4th I give unto Martha Jane Brooks the following negroes to wit: Charles, Charity, Wash, Edmund, Sarah Jane, Webster, Peter, Sol, George, Rachael, Margaret and Ellen, one lot or more which I purchased from Mr. Wm. Gus Bay mare and Colt, one Cow and Calf and six Head of Sheep, to have and to hold to her and to her heirs and assigns forever.

Item 5th I will unto my wife Mary Pace for her use and benefit during her life the remainder of my Estate to wit: Sanders Mules, Horses, Hogs, Cattle and whatsoever else may remain or be, and at her death to go to and become the property of my Brother Etannah Pace his heirs and assigns forever.

Item 6th I will unto my Brother Etannah Pace my distribution Slave and my said Brother William Pace, distribution Slave at my death. The other (Peter Pace) Estate to him and his heirs, to have and to hold forever.

Item 7th I hereby constitute and appoint my Brother Etannah Pace the executor of this my last Will and Testament with full power to execute the same.

In Testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and Seal on the seventh day of July 1864. Clement Pace Sealed.

We do hereby certify that Clement Pace before sealing published and doth cause the foregoing instrument as his last Will and Testament in our presence, and that at his request we have subscribed the same as witness in the presence of the testator and each other.

Subscribing Witnesses, and that the same was voluntarily executed by him
while he was of sound mind and disposing mind and memory.
