

Last Will & Testament of Henry Matthews Esq.

State of Georgia. In the County of Baldwin. Henry Matthews of said State and County being of advanced age, but of sound mind disposing mine and mine effects that I must shortly depart this life, deem it right and proper to make a proper disposition of my family and myself that I should make a disposition of my property with which a kind providence has blessed me, I therefore make this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking and annulling all others by me heretofore made.

I desire and direct that my body be buried in a decent and christlike manner, suitable to my circumstances and condition in life. Soul I trust, shall return to rest with God who gave it, and I hope to be reunited to the dear and attainment of the blessed Lord Jesus Christ.

I desire and direct that all my just debts be paid without delay.

I will and bequeath to my beloved wife Martha Matthews my two Lots of Land lying in the 10th dist of said County being as well as I now recollect the numbers 346 and 345 for and leaving her natural life or so long as she chooses to live on them, the said being my plantation near Milledgeville; also one Negro man named Ireland about 30 or 35 years of age, black skin, plain; one Negro woman named Louisa about 30 years of age, and her three children namely a boy 7 years of age, a boy 6 years old & a boy 15 months old, two children three choice Cows & Calves, one sow and pig, choice - one yoke Oxen & Cart, two plow horses, grain & plow to go with the estate, 1 Top Buggy & Harness, 2 chairs, including two, one chair, one Bed & the furniture belonging to said beds & 2 Bedsteads (chairs), 1 chest, bag, dog, chair, half Hog, Hides, 3 Sashes, 30 Buttons & parts, 2 patchwork barrels, 1 set of Spoons, 1 set Cups & saucers, 2 choice Bells, and all the balance of my household & kitchen furniture is given to my said wife for and during her natural life, as well also the Negro being mentioned in this item is given to my said wife for and during her natural life.

I give & bequeath to my dear child Martha the sum of One thousand dollars in money out of the sale of my property, over and above any and equal share of my estate; she having lived with me and done much for my comfort and happiness.

I give & bequeath to my daughter Mary Matthews one thousand dollars in money out of the sale of my property, over and above any and equal share except the share of my daughter Martha of my said estate; she having lived with me & done much for my comfort and happiness. I also want it distinctly understood that I give to my daughter Martha & Mary one thousand dollars each in money out of my other children for the reasons & conditions.

I desire & bequeath the balance of my estate to be sold and the proceeds after paying of all my debts to be divided equally among all my children living & dead with all the property, with the exception of the share of my daughter Martha, I want to be seen and equal share of the said children share one share each and one share of the said children.

18th 1848 selling many shares from which I should have Note

After deducting from that portion of my book, Arthur Matthews must say
\$4 per volume. I may advance him and I on which I should say not.

That my desire why he fully understands in this sense I mean that my
 Sons Lincoln, Francis and so forth, the power of coming to settle against
 them into my estate, or all into the same in settlement with the land
 interest before then shall be settled some portion of the estate.

I constitute and appoint you, my dear friend, to receive and
 pay to the order of the Treasurer of the American Anti-Slavery Society
 the sum of \$100.00 for the year ending 1844.
