I James Dowdell Son, of Chambers County, State of Alabama, do hereby make, declare and publish this writing, to be my last will and Testament After the payment of my just debts out of the debts due me, I dispose of my Estate in the following manner to wit:

I give to my wife, Caroline Dowdell, all the property that came from her Father and Brothers estate, to wit: I require name Nelson Lucy, Eliza, Jerry, Joanna, Amy, Fanny, and her two children Robert and Rachael. John, Patience and Eli as her own property in fee simple, to have and dispose of. She may see fit and proper.

And I give my said wife, the following, to grow for and during her natural life, for her own separate use and benefit, during her natural life after her death, to be equally divided among my children to wit: Jessie, Sophia, Henry, Anderson, Mary Bobb, Jr., Lucy, little Mary Joe, Ann, Martha, Pompe, Jacob, Figures, Stephen, Siller and his child Shelly & Henry Shilton Maurissa and her child Alice, Jim, Caroline, Charity, little Jess. & Minia for her and during her natural life: then to be equally divided between my children; Also my House once lot in the village of Oak bottom, whereon I now reside, together with all of my household & kitchen furniture and tract of Land number ten, which I purchased of Thornton; and the small lot fronting my dwelling house, together with all of the stock and farming utensils on the same, the carriage and Horses, the Horse and Buggy, one waggon and six Mules, to be her own property in fee simple of free from incumbrances.

I have before this given off to my daughter Elizabeth My rock Twenty one Negros, and Boundary tracts of Land to build one House and lot of land near Oak bottom, Georgia; also two Cherokee lots of Land; also nine quarter Sections of Land in Mississippi; also one Gold Watch: worth two hundred and fifty dollars, one piano worth four hundred and fifty Dollars,

I have before this given to my daughter Catharine Smith Sixty acres, two negroes, Henry Allights and his wife Frances, the titles to which, I have since confirmed to her Husband Robert Smith.

I have previously to this given to my son, Lewis J. Dowdell twenty one negroes, and a Settlement of Land in Harris County, Georgia and one Waggon and Ten Mules, one Buggy & Horses, & one gold watch.

I hereby give and bequeath to my daughter Rebecca L. Dowdell the following property to wit: My upper plantation lying in Harris County, Georgia near the Pine Mountain containing about two thousand acres of Land; Also the following negroes to wit: Sarah and her children, Martha, Lucy, Sarah, Melinda, Penitry & Mary, Bill and his daughter Sally, Charles & his wife Tilly and the two children living over Allen Washington and his wife Leasy & child Martha, Alvin, Tom & Beverly making twenty one in all and a Prairie & gold watch which she now has: the before mentioned sum I give to my said daughter for her own use and she may see fit and proper.

benefit & use, to use, & controlle or disposer of as she may deem best & proper for her sole & separate use. The before mentioned Negroes which I hereby give to my said daughter Rebecca L. I give to her for her Separate & sole use & benefit, for and during her natural life after her death to go and be the property of her children, and in case she should die without children or their representatives then and in that event, said Negroes are to be the joint property of my other Children or their representatives. I further give to my daughter Rebecca L. one Road Wagon and ten Miles and three hundred Dollars

I hereby give and bequeath to my daughter Susan A Dowdell the following property to wit: My Settlement of land in Chambers County, Alabama, known as my White Plains place or plantation, containing sixteen hundred acres of land; also my piece of land near Oakbowery, containing one hundred and fifty acres, which I purchased of Mr. Starr, also a house & lot purchased of Isaac Party in the village of Oak Bowery, also one other lot in Oak Bowery, purchased of Mr. Starr. Also, one Peacock & one goat both, or six hundred dollars in Cash as an equivalent of the same; all of the before mentioned property given to my daughter Susan A. is given to her for her own sole, separate & exclusive use & benefit; Also one road wagon and ten Miles and three hundred Dollars. Also the following Negroes to wit: Oliver and his wife Harriet & their children Matthew, Adam, Patsy, Charlotte, Fie Bush roa, & Catharine John & his children, Clarissa, Jack, Henry, Isaac & Jane, Betsy and her two children Dennis and Ben, Shadrack and his wife Mariah & their daughter Cherry, being twenty one in number, which said Negroes, I give to my said daughter, for and during her natural life, and after her death to be the property of her children, and in case she should die without children or their descendants; then said Negroes are to be the property of my other children or their descendants.

I do hereby give and bequeath to my daughter Louisa J. Dowdell and to my son Luther Martin Dowdell jointly & equally & for their joint & equal use, my plantation in Marion County, South of Auburn, known as the Cheveralby plantation, containing about twenty five hundred acres of land and two lots of land in Walker County Georgia; one lot known as the Meeting house lot-purchase of Henry Lowe the other lot adjoining Hopkissas Mills, both lots containing about four hundred acres.

I further give and bequeath to my daughter Louisa J. Dowdell, the following Negroes to wit: Eliza and his wife Emily and their children Charly, Sabrina, Asbury, Jim, Charley, & Eddie, Shadrack and his wife Siller & his children Alpheus, Sam, Edward, Shadrack and his wife Lucina and their children, Ophelia, Henry & Silas Pitt, and her two children Freeman and Clark being twenty two in number, the Negroes herein aforesaid daughter Louisa J. Dowdell is to have the same.

use, control and benefit during her natural life, and at her death to be the property of her children or their descendants and in the event of her death, without children or their descendants, then these negroes are to be the property of my other children or their descendants. I also give her one gold watch, one Piano or six hundred dollars as an equivalent one ready wagon, Two Mules and three hundred dollars.

I further give and bequeath to my son Luther Martin Dowdell the following negroes and property to wit; Maria Sevityer and her children, Malinda, Holly Ann, William, Caroline Isabel and an infant child, Bobb & his wife, Elizabeth & Eliza Nancy Abram & his wife Lusie & their children Jacob & Nat, Agnes & his wife Henrietta Cobb & his wife Cecilia & their two children Matilda & an infant child and Albert being twenty-one in number: and in the event my son Luther Martin Dowdell shall die without children or descendants, it shall be the property of my other children or their descendants. I further give & bequeath to him one road wagon Two Mules one Horse & buggy or three hundred dollars as its equivalent and one gold Watch or one hundred & fifty dollars as an equivalent.

I will and direct that the income of all of the foregoing negroes herein will be to my four herein mentioned children & wife, that may be after the date of this will, I shall follow the herein disposition of the respective negroes will each one of my children & wife

I do hereby give and bequeath to my Son Louis J. Dowdell, two lots of Land lying in Harris County Georgia adjoining the land heretofore given to him, being the two remaining lots of land unoccupied by me, which I own in Harris County, Georgia, containing four hundred acres more or less. I further direct that the remainder of my property after the foregoing bequest have been divided to divide equally among my six Children to wit Elizabeth Myrtle, Louis J. Dowdell, Rebecca L. Dowdell, Susan A. Dowdell, Louisa J. Dowdell and Luther M. Dowdell except the money which may be on hand left at my death, in which I direct that my wife share equally with my children.

It is my will and I hereby direct and appoint my Son Louis J. Dowdell my Executor to carry into effect, and execute the foregoing will: and it is further my will and I do hereby direct, that they carry the same into effect without being required to give bond & security.
