

Georgia: The last will and Testament of John White Considering the
 frailty of humanity; uncertainty of this mortal life and being of sound mind and
 memory do make publish and ordain this my last will and Testament in
 manner and form as follows

Item 1st It is my desire that all my just debts of (which there are but
 few) be paid out of the proceeds of my present Crop of Cotton and money
 that is due me

Item 2nd I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Clarissa White all my
 lands lying in Harvis County on the South Side of Mountain Creek and a
 small Creek that empties into Mountain Creek in the upper part of my well
 ponds with the following exceptions of Lots number (200) two hundred half lots
 number one hundred and ninety nine (199) both lying in the townships East
 of the Appomattox County containing three hundred three and three quarter acres
 which lands I give and bequeath to my son William W White I also give to said
 son lot number two hundred and forty two (242) I also give and bequeath to
 said son my Mills and all the lands that lie South of Mountain Creek and
 the small Creek that empties into Mountain Creek in the upper part of my well
 ponds he is to have the privilege of all the lands that may be over grown on
 both Creeks by raising the mill dam I also give to said son one hundred and
 twenty five (125) acres of lands lying in the Seventh District of Gurnett County
 and known as number three hundred and three (303) it being known as the white
 & gold lot belonging to John White and Hudson W Allen I give to said son
 eight negroes (boys) Solomon and his wife Martha and four Children all
 except about fourteen years old who is in the possession of Sarah Bay Le
 when she is to remain during the lifetime of Sarah Bay Le at which
 time she is to become the property with her increase of my Grand Children
 mainly Dorlisha C White Mary C White Clarissa Ann White and Emma W
 White I give to said son one negro boy about twelve years old named Frank
 and a girl named Melly about five years old and Rachel about ten years
 old and one negro man by the name of Smith about twenty five years old
 also one negro man named Sam about twenty six years old I also give
 to my four Grand Children the following negroes to Dorlisha C White one negro
 woman named Caroline and her Child Alexander and to Mary C White one
 negro girl about fourteen years old named Velate and to Clarissa Ann White
 I give a negro girl about seven years old by the name of Barbara I also
 give to my Grand Daughter Emma W White a negro girl about eight years
 old by the name of Caroline

Item 3rd I give to my wife Clarissa White the balance of my negroes
 which is about forty two in number I also give to her all my stock
 of horses mules cattle hogs and sheep I also give to her my Crop of Corn
 Prodder and oats wheat &c my Cotton I will to be sold to pay my debts I give
 to her my riding Carriage waggons carts black Smith and plantation tools together
 with all my birds hedges and house hold furniture of every description

Item 4th I give to my Sun-in-law Doctor Joshua Wilson five dollars
 only in consequence of my having given him heretofore about ten negroes
 and also an account of his abuse having died without issue

I do hereby constitute my wife Clarissa White and William W
 White my Executors and Executor to carry this my last will and
 Testament in to effect Signed Sealed and delivered in presence of
 James Whitem

State of Georgia, I James A Capaway of Harris County and State being
Harris County, of sound and disposing mind and memory and being
in feeble health and not knowing when death may come and being desirous
to make a disposition of my property before my death do make this my last
will and Testament to take effect after my death
Item 1st I will that my body be buried in a Christianlike manner accord-
ing to Customs of the County
Item 2nd I will and direct that all my just debts be paid as soon as
my Executors can collect enough out of my notes and accounts
Item 3rd I give and bequeath unto my beloved Mother Eliza Capaway during
her natural life time only my two negro boys to wit Joel a yellow negro
boy about 28 years of age and Miller a black negro boy about 33 years of
age And then at the death of my Mother I will and bequeath the said
negro boys Joel and Miller to my Brother Thomas J Capaway It is also my
will that my executor here and said negroes as long as he lives and at his
death my Mother to do the same and the money for the hire be equally
divided between my Mother and Brother Thomas J Capaway unless the effe-
ction of my Mother should require more than half the proceeds of the
hire of the above negroes together with her own means which she now
has to afford her a comfortable support in which intent I desire her to have
and enjoy the whole of the hire of said negroes annually
Item 4th I will and bequeath unto my Brother David W Capaway
the Sum of ten dollars when collected out of my estate
Item 5th I also will and bequeath unto my brother John B Capaway the
Sum of ten dollars when collected out of my estate
Item 6th I give and bequeath unto my esteemed friends and brethren in Law
Freeman W Slozier my gold watch and Chain
Item 7th As a token of my respect and high regards for my esteemed
friend F Johnston I give to him my gold pen & Case
Item 8th It is my will that if there should be any money left out of the
proceeds of my notes and accounts after paying my debts that it be equally
divided between my beloved Mother and Brother Thomas J Capaway
Item 9th I hereby constitute and appoint my worthy friend Henry B
Johnston executor of this my last will and Testament
