

Last Will and Testament of William Ingram Esq^r Recorder

State of Georgia! In the name of God I swear,

Nov: 1: 1861 (Setting that my life is best serv'd by a very uncertain
tenure I William Ingram of Sausalito & County, feel it to be right & proper
that I should make a disposition of the property which I have Provi-
dence has blessed me, and therefore do make & Ordain the following as my
Last Will & Testament, to wit:

Item 1st I desire and direct that after I am dead my body shall be buried
in a simple & Christian-like manner. My soul I trust will go to God

Item 2nd I desire and direct that my just debts be paid by my Estate with as little delay as possible.

Item 5th
It is my desire & I do direct that my property be kept together as if I were living, and as my children arrive of full age, if they desire it or as they may marry, that to them a portion of my property equal in kind with that given already to my daughter Georgia Dunn wife of John P. Templeland Georgia to be co-heiress, & dividing at age 21 in my will as above stated - as near as practicable to do so, but having attention and the difference in value at the time, to each giving, my object being to give to all to each as near as may be the amount in kind & age & essential value and not money value.

Item 4th Should my wife Mary again dispose that my property shall be divided equally between my wife Mary & No. one or my children. Should my wife Mary die, then all my property be equally divided between my children, my daughter Barbara being a ready person, first being rendered in, in kind at the time of her death, in either of the following cases,

rendered me, as nearly as the time of writing, in the month of January, 1852,
I was much as I promised my Son David W. a will, upon a certain obliga-
tion I recd him, and which I believe he has been fully obeying.
I desire and direct that my Estate, provide as a good Field, waiting to be given
to my Son David W.

June 6th I desire and direct that my executors proceed to carry out this my will without the formalities of law, as far as may be, trusting as I do to their integrity, thereby relieving my estate of all trouble, expense & delay.

June 7th I hereby declare once & for all - that I shall do my best to remain here in after named
in consultation with the other Seiglers, & let it be best to sell either
my home place, or the Mill place & change their residence, or dispose of
any block they might deem it best to dispose of, that they will be looking
to the best interest of all - My wife & my children,

I hereby appoint my wife Harriet H. & my son David W. Ingram
Executive and Executor of this my last Will & Testament, least in
David's absence John R. Chapman to act in his stead.
