

Last will and testament of Wm P Pollard deceased recorded

In the name of the God amen
I, William P. Pollard of aforesaid State and County
being of sound & disposing mind, and feeling that I must
shortly go the way of all the earth - do make and publish this
my last will and testament.

First, my spirit I resign into the hands of Him who gave it,
and my body I resign to the land, to be buried in decent
~~Christian~~ order by my surviving friends.

Secondly, It is my will and desire that my property be all kept
together by my wife, Nancy Pollard until the youngest child becomes
of age; at which time an equal division shall take place of
my estate between my my wife Nancy Pollard, shall she be living,
and all my children; my two youngest sons, my Joseph and David
having the benefit of an education in the meantime.

Thirdly, When my grandson, William Pollard, (son of my deceased
son Samuel Pollard,) arrives at age, he shall inherit his father's
distributive share of my estate; but should the said William
(Grandson) die without heirs, then his portion of my estate
shall revert to my children.

Lastly, I constitute and appoint my son Seaborn Pollard and
my wife Nancy Pollard my lawful Executors of this my last
will and testament.

day of March, one thousand eight hundred & sixty five.
