

Last Will and Testament of William H. Rutledge & Son? Recd.

State of Georgia | In the name of God, Amen I William H. Rutledge of  
Harris County, the State and County abovesaid being of a tender  
age, and bodily infirm, and therefore knowing the uncertainty of life  
desire it right and proper, both as respects myself and family to  
make a disposition of the property with which a kind Providence has  
blessed me - do make and ordain this as my last Will & Testament  
hereby revoking all others herebefore made by me

1<sup>st</sup> Item

I desire and direct that my body be buried in a plain, decent,  
christian like manner.

2<sup>nd</sup> Item

I desire and direct that all my just debts be paid without delay  
by my Executor herein after appointed

3<sup>rd</sup> Item

I give and bequeath to my beloved wife, Jane, for and during  
her natural life - and at her death to go to my children - ex-  
cepting my son Bradley Rutledge - to be equally divided  
between them as hereinafter set forth - The following property  
to wit, The lot of Land wherein my dwelling is situated, & one  
One hundred & thirty five, and the two lots of land joining with  
Mr. James Passmore, being all my land wherein I reside, excepting  
the plantation known as the "Cotton" plantation, with all the rights  
and appurtenances thereto belonging, together with the house  
hold & Kitchen furniture, except as hereinafter given to my daugh-  
ter Margaret - Also one Yoke of Oxen and Cart of her own selec-  
tion; My carriage & Carrying Horses; four Cows & Calves of her own  
selection out of my Stock of Cattle; four Sows & Pigs of bacon Sows  
of her own selection out of my Stock of hogs; Also our Negro servant  
Nancy a woman about twenty six and even years old, and her  
daughter Peggy about thirteen years old. Eliza a girl about  
seventeen years old, and a man or boy, which I intend to get in  
place of my boy Allick whom I intend to sell; but if I should not  
sell said boy Allick, then I give him to my wife Jane, and if he  
should prove unruly & disobedient - and unfit to be kept by  
her then my Executor may dispose of him by exchange for an  
other, or by sale, and purchase another - All and every her  
right in this item I make to my wife Jane during her natural  
life, as before stated, and at her death to go to & be equally divi-  
ded between my children, excepting as before said my son Dan-  
ley Rutledge - The little man given to her during her natural life  
at her death to my children in equal division with the said  
exception I give my wife Jane, a road Waggon & four mules  
of her own selection

4<sup>th</sup> Item

In as much as there was no written agreement or contract be-  
tween me & my wife at the time of our marriage, but a verbal  
promise or declaration by me to her that her property of which  
she was possessed at the time of our marriage should remain to  
I give and bequeath to her my wife Jane all the property of which  
she was possessed at the time of our marriage in full ample  
I give and bequeath to my son Bradley Rutledge the sum  
of Two Dollars

5<sup>th</sup> Item

I give and bequeath to my daughter Margaret a negro girl  
Antoinette a girl about nineteen years old, and a boy named  
Sam about four years old. Also I give and bequeath

as she may elect. One cow & calf of her own selection. One bed, bedstead & furniture of her selection. All & every bequest to her the said Margaret to her own & her children (she may have) benefit these free from the contracts of her husband - without limitation.

7<sup>th</sup> Item I desire and direct that my servant Edy, shall have his own choice of a home among my children or my wife Jane, and in the division of the negroes as hereinafter directed, her appraised value is to be deducted from the portion of the one whom she may choose if that one shall not & now her, and put to the portion of the one that shall draw her or as may be agreed on by the drawers to carry into effect my desire to give her a choice of a home or money. The remainder of my property after, and disposed of in Items Second Thru, Ninth, Fifteenth & Sixteenth, I desire and direct shall be divided into lots so as near as may be of equal value and drawn for by my children hereinafter named, - to each of them tenth part.

8<sup>th</sup> Item I give & bequeath to my daughter Lucinda McLean one tenth part.

9<sup>th</sup> Item I give & bequeath to my daughter Eliza Miles one tenth part.

10<sup>th</sup> Item I give & bequeath to my daughter Anne Billbs & her children free from the control of her present or a future husband one tenth part.

11<sup>th</sup> Item I give & bequeath to my daughter Sarah Whittier and her children free from the control of her present or a future husband one tenth part.

12<sup>th</sup> Item I give & bequeath to my daughter Elisabeth Pierce one tenth part.

13<sup>th</sup> Item I give & bequeath to my son John T. Rutledge one tenth part.

14<sup>th</sup> Item I give & bequeath to my son Thomas J. Rutledge one tenth part.

15<sup>th</sup> Item I give & bequeath to my daughter Mary McQueen and her children free from the control of her present or a future husband one tenth part.

16<sup>th</sup> Item I give & bequeath to my daughter Rebecca R. Bryant and her children free from the control of her present or a future husband one tenth part.

17<sup>th</sup> Item In addition to the bequest in Item Sixth I give and bequeath to my daughter Margaret (with the same limitations as to her husband) and her children one tenth part.

18<sup>th</sup> Item I hereby constitute & appoint my friend George A. S. & his executors of this my last Will & Testament.

19<sup>th</sup> Item In order to my desire & intention being more fully expressed in each of the Items above given where the property is bequeathed "free from the control" I desire & direct to add after the word "control" "I do not debts and liabilities, to come in before the year" of birth.

20<sup>th</sup> Item This February 6<sup>th</sup> 1858 William C. Rutledge

Georgia | Court of Ordinary November Term 1860  
Union County Personally appeared in open Court - Geo. W. Mullins  
Executor named and appointed in a paper writing purporting to be  
the Last Will & Testament of William O. Rutledge late of Union County  
deceased, and for whose said paper writing, and also personally  
came Thomas M. Collier one of the Subscribing witnesses to said paper  
writing who being duly sworn deposes & saith that he saw the  
said Testator William O. Rutledge sign, seal, deliver and publish  
the said paper writing now presented in open Court as his last  
Will & Testament freely, voluntarily and of his own accord with  
out constraint or influence whatever, that at the time of the  
execution of said will said Testator to us of sound & disposing  
mind & memory, that defendant bequeath said will as a witness  
in the presence of the Testator and at his request and in the  
presence of the other witnesses that he saw William Pease and  
Thomas G. McTosh the other witnesses sign said will in the pres-  
ence of the Testator and at his request
