It is my will and dying request, that after adjusting all my temporal concerns and paying off my just debts that my remaining, both real & personal estate be divided as follows
To wife, I give and bequeath two Negroes, a man by the name of Anderson, and Susan with the increase of said Susan during the natural life of my said wife Martha, at her death, said Negroes, with the increase of said woman Susan to be returned to my estate, and to be equally divided between my hereinafter named children, and the one my wife is supposed to be pregnant with. N. B. I gave to my Daughter-in-law Levi Lowry a Bill of Sale for the above named girl Susan, on verbal consideration before Matthew McCullers & Alfred Orr. that he, said Lowry was not to take her from me. I give and bequeath to my son Camille, two Negro boys, viz Mack a boy about twenty years old & Willard a boy nine years old. also two good work Horses with ploughs and gear to work said Horses. also one sow & pigs, one cow & calf, one feather Bed & furniture for the
