one negro man William - I give to my nephew John Coff one
negro Boy Minson - I give to my Niece Margaret Cunningham
one negro Girl Cynthia - I give to my nephew James Coff one
negro Boy David - I give to Nephew Andrew Cunningham
one negro woman Lucy and her Child Mary Ann - I give to my
nephew Edward Coff one Bed and furniture, and the balance
my property to be equally divided between the following heirs
Hugh M. Cunningham, George Coff, Green Coff, Jazrell Coff,
John R. Cunningham, except my Sordd Horse, I give to my
nephew Joseph Coff - It is my will that my Brother Joseph
T. Cunningham and Edward Story be my Executors - In witness

of flour per year to do with and use as she may think

to live with any of my Children that she thinks proper, and
they are to have the use of the negro woman when my wife
does not want her, and they are to have a reasonable allowance
out of my estate, for her support, Maintenance & Burial expen-
ses.
- 2nd I give and bequeath unto my Bond Son Francis McElhamon
a negro Girl by the name of Lelia for his own proper use
and if he dies, without a legal heir, she is to be equally
divided among his brothers and sisters.
- 3rd I give unto my son Hugh, one hundred dollar in Cash -
- 4th I give unto my son Cooper, thirty dollar in Cash -
- 5th I request that my son James shall have one Cow & Calf
Bed and furniture - My Daughters Eleanor Bell, Elizabeth
McMurtry and my son John McElhamon have long since
received what I intended for them. and they are not to
be considered as having any part of my Estate in any
way whatever. My wish and will is that my plantation
