I Elizabeth Cunningham of the County of Jackson State of Georgia knowing that  
it is appointed to all people to die have thought proper being very old but of perfect  
mind & right judgment to make this my last will disposing of all my property  
in the following manner First, reserving to my self all the right to or in any  
wise pertaining to all my property during my natural life to be thereby com-  
fortably & amply supported during my natural life. Then to be decently buried  
Secondly, Then after my death that is my Will that all my property not used for my  
support & burial shall be equally divided between my three children now living  
that is to say, my son James Cunningham, my son Joseph T. Cunningham & my  
daughter Mary, Dops that is to say Negroes, land, house hold & kitchen furni-  
ture & house hold goods & that is to say Sarah a Negro woman, Anna a Woman, Ma-  
to a woman & her two children & all their issue during my natural life, and  
all my stock of every kind shall be divided between my three above named children  
that is to say my s... James Cunningham, my son Joseph T. Cunningham & my  
daughter Mary Dops equally It is my will that all the above named property  
negroes, stock, house hold & kitchen furniture & shall be equally divided between  
my two sons & daughter as above named & also a lot of land which I own in  
original Cherokee County now Floyd County, this section & twenty fourth  
district known & being marked by the plan of said district by number two  
hundred & sixty three in said district which lot of land was drawn by me and  
granted to me which is or has been incumbered <sup>with</sup> an Indian improvement  
It is my will also that the above lot of land shall be sold, the money  
after the sale be equally divided between my three children to wit

my son James Cunningham, my son Joseph T. Cunningham & my daughter  
Doss which tot of land I have given or sold or died, that is to say the  
number two hundred & sixty, three in the third section & twenty four with distinct in  
nal Cherokee County, or signed some piece of writing or pieces of writing to John  
my grand son, whatever piece or pieces of writing I may have had signed  
was obtained without consideration & it was not my will to do so at any  
had been in my right mind if I did it at all, about the time <sup>they</sup> I sold or  
signed some papers to John Doss I was in much trouble about the loss of  
son Andrew Cunningham who had died a few days before, about  
10th of May 1834 he died, my son Andrew Cunningham had lived with  
me, & taken care of me for many years, & for some considerable time of  
death, I have but little knowledge what I did & I do consider any paper  
I might have signed at that time to be fraudulently obtained from me, as to  
to the above described lot of land, or to any person for any of my negroes or any  
property which I have, or might have so fraudulently as I did or designed  
is not my will, nor ever was to dispose of my property in any other than to di-  
vide equally between my three surviving the death of my son Andrew Cunningham  
that is to say my son James Cunningham, my son Joseph T. Cunningham  
daughter Mary Doss, & it is my will that all the very death bond, or deed, or be-  
sale if any, shall be null & void to no effect, & if there is any deed paper  
The hands of any person or persons it is my will that they deliver them up  
that I shall have the pleasure to destroy them as I do hereby declare they be-  
last will & testament. It is further my will that all the property or the  
willed to my daughter Mary Doss after her death, her having the property after  
death & enjoying it during her natural life then shall be divided between  
daughter Doss & three daughters equally that is to say my daughter  
Doss having the property or money given up to her at my death then in-  
joying it during her natural life, & then to be given exclusively to her three  
daughters Elizabeth, Jane & Sarah at her death & I do hereby appoint  
& Edward Story & Joseph T. Cunningham to be my executors to transact  
my business as they may think best or most advantageous for those who  
have made my Legatee in the above will the 9th day of June 1835

And I wish & desire for her to continue to let the two orphan children who now live now live with her until they shall become of lawful age to wit John Wood & Frances Wood I then do give & bequeath unto my nephews James Wood & William Wood five hundred Dollars each also my nephew Henry Smith fifteen hundred Dollars also to my two nieces the Daughters of my sister Smith of Franklin County Georgia five hundred Dollars each to John Wood & Frances Wood one thousand Dollars each to be paid out of my said
