In the name of God Amen I Henry Walker of the county of
 Jackson State of Georgia being very low & weak in body though
 in perfect sound mind & memory do hereby constitute & ordain this my
 last will & testament In testimony whereof I first & hequeath my
 soul to almighty God from whence it came & my body to the dead
 to be buried in a decent manner in the earth from whence it came
 My will & desire is that my wife Christian Walker shall have during
 her life or widowhood all & singular my good & chattles to wit lands
 & tenements except forty acres of the tract known as on which is
 the same comprehended in this will which said forty acres I give
 unto my daughter Jane Paulson during her life & then to
 return to my son Althea Walker the said forty acres to be
 laid off on the west side of the creek running down with
 the creek & line for the complement of land Also all my negro
 household & kitchen furniture stock of every kind & with every
 other article that I may be possessed of my desire is provided the
 the said Christian Walker & heirs the said negroes will otherwise
 they may go the Negroes hereafter mentioned & the property
 & the property above described is to remain & kept together on
 the plantation during the life or widowhood of my wife Christian
 Walker & then to be distributed in the manner following
 Item my will is that my negro woman Lucy be sold and the
 money equally divided among my children Althea Walker
 Jane Paulson & my daughter Jane Paulson

I give & bequeath to my son John Walker to him & his heirs forever one negro boy named Dave, I then I give & bequeath to my son William Walker to him & his heirs forever one negro boy named bow I then I give & bequeath to my daughter Martha Ship to her & her heirs forever one negro girl named Fannie, I then I give & bequeath to Elsie Walker the tract of land whereon I now live containing three hundred acres except the forty acres before mentioned to Jane Pauline her life one barrel horse named buck one negro girl named Cynthia one bed & furniture which I formerly lay on to him his heirs & assigns forever

I then my will & desire is that the rest of property to wit household kitchen furniture horses cattle & sheep &c heretofore not mentioned may at the death of my wife Christian Walker equally divided amongst the following negroes namely John & William Walker Elizabeth Hewitt (and) Pauline John Walker Martha Ship William Walker & Elsie Walker, I then I give to my son John & William Walker the tract of land drawn by me in the the third district of Baldwin County No 126 to be equally divided between the said John & William Walker, My desire & will is that my wife Christian Walker & my son in law William Ship my son Elsie Walker be joint executors & executors to see this my last will & testament executed agreeable to law & looking all others will or wills whatsoever testament or testaments as conform constitute & ordain this my last will & testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this 2^d of August 1806 signed & sealed in presence of
