 of the Peace for the County of Chatham
 3- said Humming that it is customary
 for all men to die & being desirous of disposing
 of the property it has pleased God to bless me
 with & I now being old & feeble in body
 out of sound & sound mind & memory do
 make this my last will & testament in manner
 & form following viz-

Item 1st I give & bequeath to my beloved wife
 Elizabeth one half of my Estate both real &
 personal

Item 2^d I give & bequeath to the heirs of my
 step son Christopher Kimble one fourth part
 of my Estate both real & personal

Item 3^d It is my will that the remaining fourth part
 of my Estate both real & personal be given to the heirs
 of my step son William Patrick

Item 4th I give to Elizabeth Kimble an inhabitant
 of this County One hundred dollars in cash &
 that the legacy of one hundred dollars to be
 taken from the part of my Estate left to the
 heirs of Christopher Kimble & William Patrick
 so as to leave my said wife the entire half
 of my Estate -

Item 5th It is further my will & desire that the
 whole of my Estate be appraised by dis-
 interested persons & that a division be made
 according to the valuation fixed by said
 appraisers

Item 6th And lastly I hereby nominate
 constitute & appoint my wife Elizabeth
 & my friend Thomas J. Davis to be
 executors & administrators to carry into
 effect this my last will & testament
 hereby revoking all former

by me made - In witness whereof I have
 wrote this my hand & seal this first day
 January 1842
