The difference in the value of the several lots was found to be as follows. Number 4 was worth twenty-two hundred dollars & hence Eighty dollars less than an average lot. No 1, was worth twenty-four hundred & fifty dollars & hence one hundred & seventy dollars over an average. No 2 was worth twenty-two hundred dollars & hence eighty dollars

under an average. No 2 was worth \$22.50 & hence 30 was the average. No 3 was worth \$23.00 & hence 20 was an average & distribution should bring worth twenty two hundred & eighty dollars having settled the ^{lot} value & mode of equalizing the next step was to assign to the distributees their lots in a fair manner. To accomplish this we wrote down on five pieces of paper the names of the distributees and on five other pieces of paper the different numbers of the lot No 1. No 2. No 3. No 4. No 5. These five pieces of paper were then put into two lots, the pieces with names of distributees in one lot the pieces with names of distributees in another lot & both lots were then well shaken, & disinterested persons were then selected by the commissioners to draw from both lots the drawing was as follows a lot was drawn from one lot then a name from another & lot was drawn from one lot then a name from another until the several pieces of paper were all drawn, the lots as they were drawn were determined should go to the person whose name was drawn from the lot under these arrangements.
