State of Georgia, in the name of God Amen
 I William G. Carr being of sound
 and disposing mind and being disposed to settle
 my worldly affairs while I have strength to do so
 make and retain this to be my last Will and
 Testament hereby revoking all Wills heretofore
 made by me.

I first of all I desire that my body be decently
 buried.

That my just debts all be paid
 Wishing that the remainder of my worldly
 effects I give and bequeath to my beloved
 daughter Charity Carr for her own
 proper use.

I also I appoint William Dugay my
 my Executor on this my last Will
 and Testament.
