Jones County the state and county aforesaid being weak of
body though in perfect mind and memory and knowing
that is once appointed for all men to die I do make and ordain
this my last will & Testament. I item the first I give and bequeath
to my beloved wife Sarah Walker all my estate both real &
personal during her natural lifetime or widow hood to wit
one lot of land in the county of Bibb by no 349 in the thirteenth
district formerly Monroe also one other lot in the County of
Henry known by lot no 48 in the ninth district also one half
lot in the County of Jones whereon she now lives also two neg-
roes namely Mose & Leah also one bay mare and one cart to-
gether with all my household and kitchen furniture plantation
extensive stock of hogs & cattle & sheep all of which I give and
bequeath to my beloved wife for her to dispose of as she may
think proper for the maintenance of our children. I item the
second I do give to my beloved son William Walker one bay
horse but there shall be deducted out of this part of
the said estate sixty eight dollars and thirty cents all the

residue or remainder of whatsoever kind ^{which Georgia law} ~~which Georgia law~~ ^{he bequeath} to my beloved wife — and I do hereby appoint my beloved wife Sarah Walker Executrix & Zachariah Booth Jun^r Executor of this my last will & Testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this 9th day of April 1825-

Giles Drivers Sen Will

In the name of God Amen this 12th June 1824 I, Giles Driver Sen^r of Jones County and state of Georgia, being weak of body but of sound and perfect mind and memory do make and declare this to be my last will and Testament in manner and form following that is to say
Item I give and bequeath to my son Julius Driver one Negro woman named Rachel also one bed and furniture to him and his heirs forever.

Item I also sell unto my son Julius Driver one Negro man named William for and in consideration of the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars to be paid twelve months after my decease. The condition of the above item is such, that if the said negro man William is dead at my decease then this item to be null and void otherwise to remain in full force and virtue.

Item I give and bequeath to my son Giles Driver Jun^r one Negro boy named Benjamin also one bed and furniture to him and his heirs forever.
