

James Cook's Will.

Georgia. In the name of God Amens -

Jones County I James Cook being weak in body but of sound mind and knowing that it is appointed unto man once to die, and after death to judgment do make and Ordain this to be my last Will and testament in manner and form following to wit, 1st I give my body to the dust and my soul to God from whence it came in hope of a blessed immortality beyond the grave. 2nd I give unto my beloved and affectionate wife Martha Cook the lot or square of land on which I now live, together with a small purchase of seventeen or eighteen acres purchased last from John Emerson, with all the improvements and houses on said two parcels of land, to her and her heirs forever. I also give my said wife Martha Cook her choice of the two fellows named Caldwell and Peter and I also give her a Negro woman named Cherry, and I desire my said wife to have all the household and kitchen furniture, and as many of the plantation tools as she may want, together with a mule traded for by me from Thomas Shreat and a horse by the name of Farmer. And my will is that my said wife should have the one half of the surplus crop after paying all my just debts and necessary expenses and furnishing provisions for the whole family a twelve month. I also give my said wife ten head of hog, ten head of sheep and six head of cattle, to have the whole of the above named part of property according to the above designation to be for her and her heirs forever.

Item 3rd I give unto my son Thomas Cook the whole of the balance of my estate both real and personal to him and his heirs forever.

Item 4th I do hereby appoint my beloved wife Martha Cook my executrix and my son Thomas Cook and my friend Thomas Shreat Executors to this my last Will and testament. This the 14th day of October 1829. as witness my hand & seal,

Georgia I This my last will and testimony made in the
Jones County 3 year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and
thirty by the Grace of God, I do truly and earnestly
acknowledge that I am in my right mind, and capable
of acting and giving according to my desire, as much at
the present when my wishes were expressed as ever I was,
therefore I want no alteration or change in my gifts
for I feel strong in mind though weak in strength of the
system. I therefore will or give to my beloved wife Sabitha Hopkins
the tract or parcel of land that I now live on during her nat-
ural life, and at her death to be equally divided between Harry
Hopkins my son and Sabitha Hopkins my daughter, and also
I request and give all the heirs an equal portion with those that
has already received them viz: Nancy Morris and Sarah Emberson
my daughter has received one bed and furniture, one cow and
calf one cow and pig, - In like manner do will the rest of the
heirs distinctly the same, having or claiming said property, when
marriage or becoming of age, and those divided tracts viz: One
tract of land lying in Early County one in Erwin, and one in Car-
rol County, those three tracts above mentioned, I give an equal
part to those heirs as follows: - Nancy Morris, Sarah Emberson,
Mary Hopkins, Marian Hopkins and Jane Hopkins. I will to my be-
loved wife all the household furniture, and horses with every other
particle that now attached to said premises without a removal
of any thing until her death and then my son Harry Hopkins I
give a chose horse and the balance of horses I took of every kind
with every attached article of utensils &c. Whereof I do hereunto
set my Seal this August 22nd A.D.
