James C. Robertson's Will.

In the Name of God Amen, I James C. Robertson of the County of Jones and State of Georgia, being of Sound mind but in a low state of health and knowing the uncertainty of life - do make this, and subscribe to it as my last will and testament in manner and form as follows.

I tem 1st I wish my Body Buried in a Christian like manner.
I tem 2nd I wish all my just Debts to be paid out of a Sale of any of property I wish property to be sold as my Executors & Creditors may think most advisable to make the same.

3rd I wish my loving wife Elizabeth Robertson to have all my property so as to pay the Debt which I am owing and for which purpose she is authorized to sell any of the property. She may think proper to enable her to do so.

4th I wish my children all to remain with their mother so as to be raised and schooled by her on my property.

5th I wish should my loving wife die before any or all of my children are grown up or of age, then and in that case, I wish my property to be equally divided among all my children.

6th I wish my loving wife to have all my lands thus one tract of land in Muscogee when drawn, now Marion County. One 1/2 in Creek when drawn, now Louisa County, the tract whereon I now live and a tract in Twiggs County which is now in law. Should I gain it also a lot of forty acres in the gold region not known in the Cherokee county.

7th I wish all the lands that my wife may be in possession of to be after her death equally divided between my two sons Lewis Robertson and James C. Robertson.

8th I wish my loving wife to have my negro girl named Eliza. As I give my property to my loving wife to enable her to pay my Debt and raise and school my children.

9th I nominate and appoint my Uncle Adam Robertson as my Executor, and my loving wife Elizabeth Robertson as my Co-Executor to this my last Will and Testament given under my hand and seal this 28th January 1833.
