Jesse Cox's Will.

Georgia I in the name of God Amen, I Jesse Cox Sen^r
Jones County } of said State and county being weak in body,
but of sound mind and disposing memory do make this my last
will and testament in manner and form following (to wit)

Item 1. I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Nancy Cox
One negro man Daniel, one Negro Woman Zephia with her
future increase one negro boy Ambrose about twelve years of
age, one bed and furniture, to her and her heirs forever.

Item 2. Also one lot or tract of land containing two hundred
and two and half acres more or less situated, being and
lying in the sixth district of originally Baldwin now Jones
County being distinguished in the plan of said District by
number one hundred and fifty five No 155 and granted to
Thomas Haywell to have and to hold the said tract of land
with all and singular the rights members and appurtenances
thereto belonging unto her the said Nancy Cox during her
natural life, and at her death to revert to her four children
namely Eva, Nancy, Leander and Franklin & to them and
their assigns forever.

Item 3. I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Nancy
Cox for her own proper use and benefit my negro

pleasure carriage, with the horses attached thereto and appendage thereto belonging.

Item 4th I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Nancy Cox, two cows and calves for her own proper use and benefit.
Item 5th Whereas I have four chances, in Lottery now in operation, in Milledgeville, for the Cherokee Land and Gold (viz.) Two in the Land and two in the Gold Lottery, I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Nancy Cox, to my beloved son Jesse Cox and Sampson, my son Ira and my daughter Nancy and Leander and my son Franklin W. Cox a joint and equal interest in any and all the Land or Gold, that I may be entitled to in said Lottery should I prove to be a fortunate drawer in the above mentioned Land & Gold Lottery - My reason for giving my interest in the Lottery as above described is that my other children and near relatives have an interest of their own exclusively in said Lottery - and my wife and children mentioned in the last above Item, have no other interest pending in said Lottery - except this derived from me.

Item 6th And my will further is that the balance of my property both real and personal not deeded or willed away to be sold on a credit of twelve months, and the proceeds thereof after the payment of my just debts and legacies to be equally divided between my wife and all of my children so that each shall have an equal part or interest to them and their heirs forever. Item 7th And lastly I appoint Thomas Moughon and J. W. Gordon my executors, to execute this my last will and testament, and it is also my wish that said Thomas Moughon and John W. Gordon act as Guardian for my children, this the 13th December 1832.

George Miller's Will Jones County May 17-1834.

I or the name of God Amen I George Miller of the county of Jones and State of Georgia being at this time weak in body, but of sound disposing mind and memory and knowing the mortality of all men think proper to make and ordain this my last will and testament after recommending my soul to God who gave it and my body to the Earth to be buried at the discretion of my family and friends proceed to dispose of my worldly estate which it has pleased God to bless me with in the following manner (viz) 1st I loan to my beloved wife Martha Miller for and during her natural life, one tract of Land whereon I now reside, five negroes, viz Beck, Viney, Edmund, Henry & Calborn, one Brown Horse called Ted, four cows such as she may make choice of, the stock of Hogs, one clock, Two feather beds, bedstead and furniture, and of farming tools sufficient for her use — 2nd I give and bequeath unto my son Edmund Miller the sum of ten dollars — 3rd I give and bequeath to my son Charles S. Miller two notes of hand which I hold against him for twenty five dollars each dated the fifteenth day of December 1828 with a credit on one of the notes for five dollars together with the interest which have accrued there on — 4th I give and bequeath unto my son Elijah Miller the sum of fifty dollars — 5th I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Nancy & her son the sum of ten dollars — 6th I give and bequeath unto my daughter Sarah Gammon the sum of ten dollars — 7th It is further my will and desire that all the balance of my estate both personal and real be sold on a credit of twelve months and the proceeds be equally divided between seven of my children, namely Elijah Miller, Savannah Johnson, Matilda Mattock, Polly Stans, Winnie T. Miller, Serena Hawkins, Alletha A. Miller, 8th It is my will and desire that my daughter Alletha Miller have the small House which her self was swopped for for her own personal benefit — 9th It is further
