place I recommend my soul to God who gave it to me & my  
body to be buried in a decent & Christian like manner, &  
as to the worldly goods which it has been pleasure to God to  
bestow on me which it is my will at my death for my  
wife Nancy Smith to have all my estate both real & per-  
sonal (toint) after paying all my just debts my three  
negroes Hannah & her child Patience & Peter & my horses  
& all my stock of every kind also my land & house hold &  
kitchen furniture all my notes bonds and book accounts  
together with all my working utensils & I do also appoint  
my beloved wife Nancy Smith my executor to my will  
given from under my hand & seal this 30<sup>th</sup> day of October  
1818

### Learon Pitts Will.

In the name of God Clement & Learon Pitts of the State of South Carolina + district of Newberry being in tolerable good health & body + of perfect sound mind + memory thanketh be to God for his mercies but calling to mind the mortality of this mortal life + knowing that it is appointed for all persons once to die do make + ordain this my last will + testament.

In the first place I recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty God and my body of flesh to the grave to be decently buried at the discretion of my executor hereafter to be named and in communion with worldly estate as God in mercy hath been pleased to bless me with I give + dispose of in the form and manner following = In the first place I give to my beloved wife Nancy Pitts one leather bed + furniture one bedsheet + one worn out saddle to dispose of at her will + pleasure in the second place I give to my sons Moses Pitts + Westley Pitts one horse a piece to be of the value of eighty dollars each, thereby I leave to my beloved wife during her lifetime one third part of my lands + one negro slave named Tom. fourthly I leave to my beloved wife all the rest of my estate both real + personal of all kinds during her widowhood + she is to pay all my just debts and to raise and school my children, and when any of my children, and when any of my children marries she is to pay over to them such a part of the property as she together with my exec shall think right + charge them with so much of their part recd and fifthly, if my wife should marry my will is that all the property left to her during her widowhood of all the property left to her during her widowhood of all kinds both real + personal be sold + the money there arising to be equally divided among all my children namely Nancy Pitts, Westley, Betsy, Lydia, Nancy, Peter, + John.
