Lewis Wimberly's Will

Georgia Jones County

I Lewis Wimberly of the State and County aforesaid being of sound mind and memory make & ordain this my last will and testament (to wit) I give and bequeath to my Daughter Elizabeth Childers one Negro Woman named *Agar one Negro man named Joe that George Childers the husband of the said Elizabeth have traded by my consent, and a boy named Sonny a boy named Charles a Girl named Pleasant and a Girl named Patience with the increase of said negroes. I give and bequeath to the heirs of Titus Wimberly Deceased (to wit) Lewis S. Wimberly, Samuel Thomas Wimberly and Milly E. Wimberly all that part of that lot of Land No Eighteen in the Eighth District of Originally Baldwin now Jones County which was not assigned off at the dower of Martha Wimberly the widow of the said Titus deceased and after the death of my wife Milly Wimberly. I give and bequeath to the heirs aforesaid the dower in said Lot Eighteen also two negro boys named Peter and Alfred and a Girl named Hester with the increase of said negroes. I give and bequeath to my grand daughter Eliza N. Pinson a negro woman named Hatty a man named Anthony and a boy named Ned with the increase of said negroes. I give and bequeath to my daughter Sally Wims a negro woman named Dinah a Girl named Margret a boy named Charles a boy named Joe a boy named Bob and a Girl named Jude with the increase of said negroes. I leave to my Wife Mary Wimberly during her natural life all that lot of Land whereon I now live with the appurtenances thereunto belonging known as No Seventeen in the eighth district of said County. Also Martha Wimberly dower in Lot Eighteen in said district. Also a negro man named Jeff a man named William and a woman named Polly a woman named Luekey

a boy named Charles and a girl named Bechy, after the death of my wife I give the said Bechy to my daughter Mary W. Brantly. I also loan my said wife two thirds of my Stock of Horses, Cattle Hogs and Sheep, and the other third I give to my son Lewis D. Wimberly. I also loan my big and harness to my said wife and all my house hold and kitchen Furniture. I give Lewis D. Wimberly I should say before the death of his mother Milly Wimberly he is to be fixed to house keeping out of the house hold furniture in as good a manner as any of the other children that have married and at the death of my wife I give all my household and kitchen furniture to my son Lewis D. Wimberly. I loan two thirds of my plantation tools and gear to my wife and the other third I give to my son Lewis D. Wimberly. I loan to my son John B. Wimberly the following negroes Patton a man Freeman a man Isaac a boy Phisy a woman and Rose a girl. My wife Milly Wimberly is to keep my son John B. Wimberly with the above named property during her life and if the said John B. should die before his mother, she is to have the use of said negroes during her life time, and at the death of said Milly Wimberly and also at the death of the said John B. Wimberly all the property loaned to them that is not otherwise disposed of is to be divided in the following manner (to wit) Lewis Wimberly's deceased three children to have the one fourth part and Elizabeth Childers Mary W. Brantly and Lewis D. Wimberly the other three fourths equally divided and all my other property that is not disposed of in this will to be equally divided between the four heirs above named after paying all my just debts. I give to my daughter Mary W. Brantly the following negroes Vilet a woman Emoline a woman Mary a boy Selcy a girl Sarah a girl and Mike a boy with the increase of said negroes. I give to my son Lewis D. Wimberly all that part of that Lot of Land No Thirty two in Eighth district of originally Baldwin now Jones County lying on the North West Side of Andersons Creek containing one hundred and fifty acres more or less also one hundred and ninety one and one half acres part of Lot No Sixteen and nine in said Eighth district, also three negro men (to wit) Hasdy, son and General, also a boy named George a woman named Lucy and a girl named Esther with the increase

of said negroes I also will that all my just debts shall be paid
by executors herein after appointed in the following manner
(To wit) my son Lewis B. Wimberly is to have the full Power
in his own name to sell a lot of Land Travers by me in the
Sixteenth district of Early County in any manner that in his
judgment will be most advantageous and appropriate the money
to the payment of my debts, my crop of cotton is to be sold and
put to the use of the payment of my debts. If there should not
be a sufficiency my wife and my son Lewis B. is to put their
hands together and plant and cultivate fifty acres of Land in
cotton and sell the same for the payment of ^{my} just debts and
at the death of my wife Milly Wimberly the two thirds of my
Stock of Horses, Cattle, Hogs and Sheep to be sold for the pay-
ment of my debts my crop of corn is to be put to the use of
the family, my waggon and Gear. I loan to my wife and
my son Lewis B. and at the death of my wife I give my
said Waggon and Gear to my son Lewis B. Wimberly. If there
should be any over plus in the above appropriation for the
payment of my debts, I give and will it to my son Lewis
B. Wimberly. And I do hereby constitute and appoint my
wife Milly Wimberly my executrix and my son Lewis B. Wim-
berly my executor of this my last will and testament, thereby re-
voking all other wills or bequeaths made by me and making
and confirming this to be my only true will and testament made
by me In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and
affixed my Seal this twenty ninth day of April in the year of
our Lord eighteen hundred and thirty

Copy of John Kirk's Will.

In the name of God Amen. I John Kirk of the County of Jones and State of Georgia of Sound mind and memory do constitute and ordain this my last will and Testament first I commit my Soul to God who gave it relying on the atonement of Christ for its eternal salvation and my Body to the grave to be decently interred at the discretion of my Executors as touching my Temporal affairs it is my will that they be disposed of in the following manner (to wit) first. It is my will that the following negroes (to wit) Dennis, Charity, Abner, Anarchy, Harris, Willis and Wiley be sold and the proceeds thereof be appropriated to the Payment of my just Debts and should there be a Surplus left it is my will that my mother Anna Kirk have the use of it during her life and then to be equally divided between my Brothers and Sisters Secondly I bequeath to my beloved Brother Levi Kirk one hundred Acres of Land known as the McGroug Place. Thirdly I bequeath to my beloved wife Lucy C. Kirk the whole residue of my estate both real and personal to be used and enjoyed and disposed of at her will and pleasure and that Lucy C. Kirk and William Kirk be my Executors and Executor to carry this my last will and testament into effect. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my Seal this 3rd October 1825.
