from this Court.

Richard Walden's Will.

In the name of God Amen I Richard Walden of Jones County
and State of Georgia being weak of body but of perfect

+ memory, and knowing it is appointed for all persons to die, and not knowing the day of my death, do make ordain constitute and appoint by these presents this my last will and testament dissolving and making void all former wills and testaments, whatsoever, this being my true and last will, this tenth day of July eighteen hundred and twelve; and I do hereby make, ordain, constitute and appoint it in manner and form following, to wit, to my sisters, Fanny Boyd, Sarah Farnbrough, Annie Cole, I leave (to be raised out of my estate after all my just debts are paid) fifty cents each, and to my brothers William Walden and Elijah Walden in like manner fifty cents each, after all my just debts are paid if any there should be, And the balance of my estate to be equally divided between my mother Mary Walden and my brother Lewis Walden provided nevertheless if I should marry and leave my wife living without any heir of my body then my said wife shall have one half of my estate as long as she lives and after her death my slaves (if any) to be emancipated and set free with any other property my said wife shall have of mine at her death, my said slaves shall possess and have a just right to the same accordingly. In like manner my mother Mary Walden and my brother Lewis Walden to have the other half of my estate equally divided between them excepting ten dollars to be raised out of the same and equally divided among my three sisters, Fanny Boyd, Sally Farnbrough, and Annie Cole and my two brothers William Walden & Elijah Walden, but if I should leave a wife of mine with lawful heirs or heir of my body living when I die then it is my will + desire that my said wife with such heirs shall have the whole of my estate or the net produce thereof after paying all my just debts if any according to law, only my mother to have a reasonable maintenance out of the same as long as she lives, And I do hereby appoint my brother Lewis Walden and my mother Mary Walden whole & sole Executors to this my last will and testament.
