



will being duly sworn saith that he heard the dec<sup>d</sup> Robert Cut-  
lers pronounce this to be his last will and testament that  
he saw him execute it as such and that he this Dependent wit-  
nessed the same in the presence of the said Robert Cutlers  
and by his request, and saw Thomas Livingston and Wilson  
Motley subscribe the same also as witnesses at the request the  
execution thereof and that the said Robert Cutlers was of  
sound mind at the time.

Georgia } Know all men by these presents that I Thomas  
Jones County } Middlebrooks of the County and State aforesaid  
blessed with Reasonable health and of sound mind but  
calling to mind the uncertainty of this life do make and  
Declare this my last Will and Testament and what lawfully  
I do it hath pleased God to bestow on me I dispose of in  
the following manner to wit -

1. I am the first my desire is that all my just debts should  
be paid - I give unto my beloved wife Anna Middlebrooks  
during her natural life three Negroes to (wit) Ned Pucky &  
Comfort One hundred acres of Land including my dwelling  
house and the one half of my spring one feather bed and  
furniture & One cow and calf - My further desire and will  
is that the rest of my property both real and personal  
has not been mentioned in this will be

improved until my youngest son Thomas Jefferson Middlebrooke comes of age, that is to say arrive to the age of twenty one years for the express purpose of Raising and Educating my Children then and at that time I give to my son William S. Middlebrooke one hundred acres of land including his house and half of my spring—

To my son James Middlebrooke one Hundred acres of Land South east end of lot No one hundred and fifty — To my son Thomas J. Middlebrooke One hundred acres of Land that I purchased of Stephen Satterwhite —

To my Daughter Petsy Willis four hundred dollars.

To my Daughter Nancy Willis four hundred dollars.

To my Daughter Polly Middlebrooke four hundred dollars.

To my Daughter Hanna Middlebrooke four hundred dollars.

To my Daughter Abbey Middlebrooke four hundred dollars.

To my Daughter Pimhata Middlebrooke four hundred dollars.

To my Daughter Sarah Middlebrooke four hundred dollars.

To my Daughter Micha Middlebrooke four hundred dollars.

then and that time when my son Thomas Jefferson Middlebrooke shall or does arrive to the age of twenty one years the increase of sickly + comfort together with the rest of my property both real + personal that has not been otherwise disposed of in this will to be sold on twelve months credit and the money to be Equally Divided among my beloved Children. It is my will that all the personal and real property at my wife Death should be sold and Equally divided between all my Children — I also constitute and appoint my wife Anna Middlebrooke Executrix and my son William S. Middlebrooke and Simonson William Willis (son of Joel Willis) Executors of this my last will and Testament. Witness my hand and Seal this twenty fifth day of October in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventeen

I now appoint James Billingslea and Adam Carson my Executor to this my last Will + Testament in testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed my seal this tenth day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty three.

### Samuel Bell's Will.

Know all men by these presents that I Samuel Bell of the state  
of Georgia and county of Jones Calling to mind the certainty of death  
and the uncertainty of life being in a low state of health but in  
perfect mind + memory have thought proper this 16<sup>th</sup> day of Febru-  
ary one thousand eight hundred + twenty six to make and ordain  
this my last will + Testament revoking all others heretofore  
made by me

first I give to my brother Isaac C. Bell two notes of hand on  
Adner Forber of the state of North Carolina Camden County Al-  
so all other notes or open accounts which are due me either  
in the state of North Carolina or in the state of Georgia to-  
gether with all other property whatsoever belonging to me. Be  
my said Brother paying all my just debts as soon as he  
can collect money from the <sup>within</sup> named notes and accounts and  
the balance he is to convert to his own use and benefit and I  
do hereby appoint my said Brother my lawful executor to this  
my last will and Testament.
